#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Accredited in 2003 at B grade with 72.00 score this affiliated centre of higher learning, is now volunteering for the II cycle re-accreditation, submitting its SSR - 2013 a faithful document conforming NAAC's guidelines and unerringly records its testament of beliefs and pursuits of excellence during the last five years.

M.G.Vidyamandir's Arts, Science and Commerce College Manmad (Nashik) affiliated to the University of Pune, Maharashtra was founded in 1969 by the visionary educationist, Karmaveer Bhausaheb Hiray, a pioneer in the field of education who uplifted the downtrodden masses and vented out the Ganga of education. The college was started in response to the acute need of lower middle class strata in the locality. In spite of academic brilliance the strata had no hope of higher education. Because there was lack of facility of higher education. The college thus fulfilled its mission of creating an educational environment for the downtrodden, middle class young males and females. The authorities of the college under the efficient leadership of Prin. M.S. Patil, Prin. P.M. Bagale, Prin. G.K. Sonawane, Prin.N.H. Raundal, Prin. Harish Adke, geared up a team of eminent professors to realize its dream to uplift downtrodden masses bestowing with the power of higher education and sticking to its great traditions laid down by the founder the institution surges ahead towards excellence. The performance appraisal of the institution is summarized as bellow:

#### 1) Curricular Aspects

Mahatma Gandhi Vidyamandir's Arts, Science and Commerce College upholds the motto of 'Bahujan Hitay, Bahujan Sukhay' in its graceful realization of the vision of empowerment of downtrodden societal strata through value based education enkindling the lamp of knowledge. The college offers 05 UG and 03 PG courses affiliated to the University of Pune. In addition, the college has an innovative UG as well as PG programmes in commerce, English and Hindi. The curriculum is strengthened by the innovative implementation of it.

The faculties enthusiastically participate in orientation / refresher courses, involvement in and organization of workshops and seminars of Regional/ National/ International level, and special guidance on ICT teaching technology, have resulted in sufficient exposure to recent advances and changes of the curriculum innovative initiative. The college now and again inviting eminent scholar professors to enlighten the faculty different disciplines have visited the college. Coaching classes are arranged to orient the students towards career development/ placement. The faculties of the college are consulted on academic matters and curriculum design development. The college establishes linkages with industry in vicinity and the University to facilitate industry internships and placements, in curriculum designing and for career planning.

At the accreditation period the research publications in International/ National / Regional journals and books publication was meagre. The active participation of faculty in workshops / seminars the major / minor research projects undertaken and the consistently high pass percentage of students have lead to increase in admissions and improvement in higher learning / employability. Now, the faculty has accelerated the research work.

#### 2) Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

Arts, Science and Commerce College continuously maintain a student centric atmosphere proving fruitful for empowering downtrodden masses. This atmosphere leads towards quality education resulting high percentage of results. The college recognizes the needy students urge to learn. Hence, it started Yashwantrao Chavan Open University Centre to facilitate the learning process of needy students 250 students on an average enrolled every year to pacify their thirst for education. As per the norms laid down by UGC and Govt. of Maharashtra the new admissions are allotted categorywise.

The students belonging to SC, ST, NT, OBC and economically backward categories are provided remedial coaching classes. The college establishes Academic Excellence Committee to identify the advanced and slow learners at the very beginning of the course concerned. The committee organizes various programmes for better the performance of weak students. Counselling Cell is provided for students at academic, personal levels. The students and the faculty are sensitized on gender and environment. The college has chalked out teaching, learning and evaluation schedules by strictly following the Academic Calender of the University. Regular blue print of the events and activites are drawn by maintaining daily academic diaries, regular meetings of IQAC. The IQAC plays yeoman's role in quality enhancement and sustenance of the teaching learning process. It encourages the faculty with electrifying atmosphere.

Teaching learning is facilitated with the use of ICT, e-content etc. State and District level seminars/workshops, guest lectures, elocution competitions are part and parcel of the learning process. Eminent scholars like Dr. Mehdi Hasan, Dr. A.B.Sawant, Dr.V.S.More, Dr. Anil Bhavsar, Dr. Bhaskar Shelke, Dr. Vittalsingh Dhakare, Dr. R.K. Deore, Dr. S.N. Nikam, Dr. Ashok Dhuldule, Mr. M.S. Dudhanikar, Dr. J.Y. Ingale delivered the lectures and inspired budding scholars for research work in their respective subjects

The library is the soul of college! It is a constant source of information with its rich collection of books, magazines, periodicals, journals, etc. The computerization of it gives internet access. It is subscribed to INFLIBNET opening the floodgates of 3000 plus e-journals and 75000 plus e-books to the faculty as well as students. No compromise in quality is the basic principle at the time of the appointments of the faculty. The appointments are based on UGC, State Govt. and University norms.

The quality of teaching-learning is meticulously nurtured at departmental, faculty and institutional levels. Internal academic audit and evaluation by stakeholders helped sustained quality.

As per the University norms internal examinations are conducted. Internal grade list of the students is published one week prior to the actual commencement of the University examination. The college has established its Grievance Redressal Cell. The cell addresses the exam related complaints. The class teachers as well as the Academic Excellence Committee monitor the progress of students performance. Progress reports are prepared to communicate results to the students. Besides progress reports personal contacts with students and their parents are made to communicate results.

#### 3) Research, Consultancy and Extension

Research activities have been progressed with leaps and bounds in recent years. Internal Research Promotion Committee proved fruitful to promote research activities. This committee acts as the link between the faculty research increase and the funding agencies. This has resulted 09 UGC funded Minor Research Projects, 01 Major Research Project, 46 research papers presented in National/International seminars/conferences, 39 research papers published in reputed National / International journals and a number of articles are also published in print media.

In the time of accreditation PG courses in Hindi and Marathi started on Non-Grant basis keeping the welfare of the students before eyes. The college successfully runs these PG courses. The college has persistently imbibing the research culture not only into the minds of faculty but students also. Students are guided to prepare small scale research projects. Institute-Industry interaction is promoted. The institute has effortlessly been striving to make the process of consultancy service available for the students to better their life and ultimately built a wholesome community.

The family of MG Vidyamandir comes into existence for the welfare of the downtrodden masses. To fulfill the aim of welfare special extension and outreach programmes are arranged for the underprivileged strata of society. The programmes such as free coaching for poor students, spreading awareness on topics of Health in nearby shanties, local men and women are helped to get employment etc.

#### 4.) Infrastructure and Learning Resourses

The institution provides well ventilated 11 classrooms; having 60 to 120 students capacity and 06 departmental well equipped laboratories having 20-30 students capacity. Basketball court and shuttle badminton court, ICT enabled hall for power point presentation as well as conducting seminars and workshops. For effective teaching-learning and research specialized labs such as Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Physics, and Geography are used. For the students of Science the College maintains Botanical Garden as well as Rose Garden. This endeavour helps perculate academic research in practical life.

The college pacifies the thirst of student players for sports. The playground consists of Volleyball court, Basketball court and Shuttle badminton court. Playground facility is provided for training in all kinds of athletic items. The sportspersons are also provided free clinical assistance including a general physician and Gynaecologist.

The library building is partially automated with the seating capacity of 50, offers facilities such as OPAC, N-List offered by INFLIBNET. Two full time staff works as supervisors to maintain the infrastructure and equipments.

#### 5) Students Support and Progession

The Students Support and Progression Cell has effectively been functioning in the college. The aim of the Cell is to boost the downtrodden students. The Cell facilitates students for various State / Central Govt. / University sponsored scholarships. Average 71% of students are availing these benefit in the college. Library books facilities, career guidance, Remedial coaching are provided to SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections.

Competitive Examination Cell, Remedial Coaching Classes, Special Coaching for slow and advanced learners, Nature Club, Hindi Club, various associations of departments have effectively been functioning to blossom the students talent. The college has established strong bondage with institution—community network. The welfare programmes implemented for the upliftment of the downtrodden masses.

Students are trained for various competitive examinations such as MPSC/UPSC, NET/SET etc. Tutorial/mentoring system is formed to give supervise teaching to selected number of mentees.

Cultural programmes including Arts Festival, Sports Day, Celebration of different National and International days ensures the participation of students in extracurricular and cocurricular activities. Expert professionals help in the development of leadership skills and life skills in the students.

The college has produced 25 National and 500 Inter-university players in various sports events. Our Corf ball, Net ball and Kabaddi teams have got runner up status in competitions.

The Students Council offers leadership opportunity to students in the Campus itself. The students representation in various committees such as IQAC, Anti Ragging, Students Grievance Redressal Cell, College magazine, Examination, Students Welfare and Library have opened the avenues of leadership.

#### 6) Governance, Leadership and Management

The college Management is very well recognized the importance of education in the lives of downtrodden masses. It makes education as a pathway to success by encouraging planned programmes. It is always ready to extend its support by providing infrastructural facilities, to the students. The college has been gifted with eminent Principals who improved the overall quality of education and implementation of innovative ideas in teaching learning endeavour.

The Management is wholly attached with its soil hence Management-society relations are very healthy. The very founder of the Institution, late Karmaveer Bhausaheb Hiray is a 'Son of the Soil'. The foundation of the college includes 11 member committee having representatives of local community. Monthly Executive Committee as well as Annual General Body provides a platform to implement the innovative schemes for the students. IQAC as well as Heads of the Departments also helped in planning and implementation of policies. Annual Quality Assurance Report provides us an opportunity to improve as well as evaluate the functioning of every year. The IQAC deals with Annual Review and progress assessment. Feedbacks are collected from stakeholders and analyzed for further quality improvement.

The college Management includes Top Management Principal, Vice principal, Heads of the Departments, Staff, Students Council and Alumnae. The college conducts a performance appraisal system for faculty based on students feedback, research consultancy and extension activities. The different welfare schemes enjoyed by the faculty and staff include advance payment of salary on request, fee concession to the children of non teaching staff etc. Finance and Accounts Department working under the supervision of senior superintendent, administration control of the Principal and headed by a Head Accountant implements all tasks related to finance and accounting. These operations are regularly audited by auditors deputed by the Directors of Collegiate Education the Account General, the Chartered Accountant

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appointed by the Government Body and an Internal Audit Body. The main source of income of the college is the funds from UGC.

Since July 2004 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been actively functioning. The academic audit is done on a daily, monthly and annual basis. It compares the academic performance of each department and institution. Teaching-Learning Review committee plays important role in undertaking Teaching Learning process review mechanism.

The college has continuously been implementing the innovative practices. Extra periods are arranged for soft skills development in students. The college encouraged interdisciplinary studies. The vision and mission of the college is attempted to realize in academic empowerment to the downtrodden students. The college is very well aware of its responsibility to the student community, the society, the nation and the environment. The students are instilled a love of nature by arranging such programmes as Save Trees-Save Life, Making our Campus Green and Clean and observing such days as Environment Day (June 5), Ozone Day (Sept. 16), World Population Day (July 11), World Forest Day (March 21) etc. The students are constantly initiated to protect the environment. They are also made aware of about eco-friendly water and energy conservation techniques viz, harvesting rainwater, raising dams, use of everlasting solar energy, to plant saplings in the nearby village. The faculty nurtures some healthy practices for students, viz, 'Clean Campus-Green Campus', 'Anaemic Examination among Adolescence Girls' etc.

- Manmad city is facing a very critical problem of the scarcity of water as it comes under the drought prone area. Even getting drinking water once in a fortnight span is cumbersome.
- > The rural stratum of students is basically very weak in using English language.
- Economically weak students constraining access to variegated fields of higher education and majority of the parents belong either to the farmers or labourers lacking awareness about higher education.

#### **Opportunities:**

- Adopting economically students by a teacher.
- ➤ To enforce Remedial Teaching effectively.
- ➤ To make central computer facility available.
- > To develope Water Harvesting System.
- For female students courses in jewellery making, fashion designing, personality development are to be started in afternoon time to maximize the utilization of infrastructure.

#### **Constraints / Challenges :**

- Funds Paucity is the root of all constraints, infrastructure involving huge funds stalled due to inadequate grants.
- ➤ Being an aided college with fixed governmental fee structure, the institution compelled to find other sources for infrastructural and development activities.
- Economically weak students as well as the students whose parents are engaged in transferrable jobs are helpless to continue higher education leading to dropout cases in the institution.

- ➤ Publishing National/International papers by all research Departments.
- ➤ Philanthropic initiatives to expand the project 'Saathi' to collect the orphans from railway junction and place them into orphanage.
- ➤ P.G. programmes in English and Geography and Research centers for Marathi and Hindi P.G. departments.
- ➤ More e-learning content in library.
- Motivate staff to undertake Major and Minor Research Projects.
- ➤ To organize National and International conferences.
- > To take more community oriented developmental programmes.

Our pioneer Late.Karmaveer Bhausaheb Hiray a great educationist, clearly signifies "To strive for academic excellence" by exploring the potentialities of economically and socially weaker sections of the society by providing them opportunities to face global challenges.

#### **Mission:**

To reach out to the poor, needy, down-trodden, segregated and deprived to uplift them by giving new directions, heights and aspirations through education.

#### **Objectives:**

- > To explore the best possible ways to realize the noble ideals of Late Karmaveer Bhausaheb Hiray.
- ➤ To act as catalyst for empowering the students to become better human beings having spirit of Nationality.
- To impart quality based higher education and facilities to the masses

The vision and mission of the college is transmitted to the students, staff and stakeholders by displaying them in the campus at notice board and other places and reinforced through college prospectus, web site, college magazine, advertisement, seminars and conferences and through Principal's speech. It is strengthened through Alumni and Parents meet, during NSS and NCC camps, on National days, Annual prize distribution and all Academic and Extracurricular activities organized by the college.

1.1.2 How does the Institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific examples.

The college meticulously plans and develops action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum which is in line with the institution's goal to empower students through quality education. At the beginning of every academic year, Principal and IQAC convenes meeting with all the HODs and discusses about the implementation of the curriculum designed by the University of Pune. Based on the number of working days and teaching days

available in the academic year, the HODs are advised to prepare teaching schedules. In turn the HODs convene meetings with their departmental teaching staff and discuss about the distribution of syllabus and ask the staff members to prepare the teaching schedules based on the teaching days available. The coverage of syllabus is reviewed by the HOD at the end of every semester/term. The Principal also convenes meetings with all the faculty members at the end of each term to review the syllabus coverage. The difficulties in the observance occurred in the form of holidays, leaves etc are compensated by conducting extra classes and syllabus is satisfactorily completed by the concerned faculty.

Deore is also a Member of Academic Council, University of Pune. Faculty member Dr. S. P. Khairnar was member of BOS in Botany of previous Body Board.

The Orientation and Refresher Courses are conducted by Academic Staff College of University of Pune for the teachers, in order to improve the teaching and to provide opportunities for professional and academic development. #### **Institution:**

The institution provides resources needed for ensuring successful delivery of curriculum, ICT, library and external expertise. The faculty members are allowed to participate in the workshops on "Syllabus Revision and Designing", organized by various colleges affiliated to University of Pune. The participation of teachers in International, National and State level conferences, seminars, workshop etc. for updating their knowledge in concerned subjects that helps in maintaining high quality in curricular aspects by keeping pace with the need of time.

Free internet facility for staff and students is provided in various departments. Teachers are provided OHPs, LCD projectors to improve teaching practices. The Institution provides library and e-resource facilities (INFLIBNET) to effectively deliver the curriculum by the faculty. Student feedback on teachers and curriculum is taken to make teaching learning more effective.

# 1.1.4 Specify the initiative taken upon or contribution made by the Institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating university or other statutory agency?

As the College is affiliated to the University of Pune, we have to follow the curriculum set by the University. Board of Studies of University in each subject which analyses and strengthens curriculum. Some of senior faculties get an opportunity to participate in designing the curriculum.

University of Pune conducts workshops to introduce and familiarize the new curriculum to all the teachers. As per the norms, the workload of the theory and practicals is distributed to the faculty members by HOD and the timetable is prepared for the theory and practical work for every subjects. If necessary, the part-time and contributory faculties are also appointed to complete the syllabi. Director of Physical education conduct sports activities as per annual plan.

Vice-Principal and faculty in-charge are appointed among the senior teaching staff to make effective transaction of the curriculum in the academic session.

At the beginning of the academic year, teachers convey and explain the aims and objectives of the course to the students. Contentwise list of ference books is given to the students. Teachers also indicate the availability of curriculum on University/college website and in the library. Facilities and skill development equipment like computers, LCD projectors etc. provided for ICT delivery and e-content development providing adequate flexibility in the choice of subjects, to the students, by offering option subjects available at the college level.

For an effective operationalisation of the curriculum, the institution networks in a various ways with the beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the universities. The Science faculty students were visited to industries, forests & museum. While, the study tour of Arts faculty was organized at historical places to enrich their knowledge. The Commerce faculty visited nearby local branch of Bank of Maharashtra, co-operative societies such as Pragati Urban, Bhagyalaxmi Nagari Sahakari Pat Sanstha, Chattrapati Nagari Sahakari Pat Sanstha to understand the actual functioning of banking.

The feedback from the stakeholders including students enables faculty to improve the curriculum delivery and professional skills.

#### 1.2 Academic flexibility:

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

#### Goals:

Our institute recently observed that several of our rural students, especially the poor, backward and the marginalized lack opportunities. It is to give them that cutting edge in a highly competitive and ruthless world. College has launched the soft skills programme in collaboration with University of Pune. This has been a phenomenal success where students have greatly benefited from the course. With a view to develop the personality and confidence amongst the rural based economically poor and marginalized students.

#### **Objectives:**

This Programme includes training in Spoken English, ways and means to appear for an interview and total personality development basically good and effective communication skills. Putting one's best foot forward. The aim of the Principal has been to bridge the gap or at least lessen it between the rich and the advantaged and poor and the disadvantaged or between the haves and have-nots. This will indeed and truly build a resurgent and a confident India. The response to the program is overwhelming amongst the rural based students.

Beside this course the N.S.S. and N.C.C. units shapes the all-round development of volunteers and cadets in future. The cadets gain 'B' and 'C' certificate in N.C.C. while the N.S.S. volunteers obtain their certificates as well as the benefit of ordinance 163 from the University of Pune.

Range of core/elective options offered by the University and those opted by the college

#### a) Core options:

Regular three years integrated courses B.A., B. Com., B.Sc., and postgraduate courses M.A.(Hindi), M.A. (Marathi), M.Com. (Commerce) are available.

#### **Bachelor of Arts (B.A.):**

Students have right to select five courses at general level out of seven options and English is compulsory subject. At second year level student can select one of the special subjects which is continued up to the third year. The subjects offered for specialization are 1) English, 2) Marathi, 3) Hindi, 4) Economics and 5) Geography. The subject environment awareness is mandatory at this stage.

#### **Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.):**

For first year, students are offered seven subjects out of which four subjects are compulsory and four subjects are optional.

- > Compulsory subjects:
  - 1) Functional English, 2) Financial Accounting, 3) Business Economics (Micro) and 4) Business Mathematics and Statistics.
- > Elective subjects:
  - 1) Banking and Finance / Office Management 2) Consumer Protection and Business Ethics/ Insurance and Transport 3) Marathi/ Hindi.

For second year there are five compulsory subjects i.e.

- 1) Corporate Accounting, 2) Elements of Company Law, 3) Business Economics, 4) Business Management and 5)Business Communication
  - ✓ One elective subject should be selected from Banking and Finance or Marketing Management, Costing and Accounting and the same subject is to be continued for third year B.Com.

In the third year B. Com. the following four subjects are compulsory i.e.

1) Business Regulatory Framework, 2) Advance Accounting, 3) Indian and Global Economic Development, 4) Auditing and Taxation.

#### **Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.):**

First year the students have to select any four subjects from

- 1. Physics, 2) Chemistry, 3) Botany, 4) Zoology,
- 5) Mathematics and 6) Geography.

At S. Y. B.Sc. level Marathi / English is compulsory and any one of the subject either Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology Mathematics or Geography should drop from first year selected subjects

At T. Y. B.Sc. level the students can opt only for Chemistry as a special subject.

#### **Postgraduate Courses:**

The Arts graduate can take the admission for P.G. courses in M.A. Hindi and M.A. Marathi, while Commerce graduate can take the admission to M.Com. (Cost & Works Accounting).

There is academic flexibility for the students to move from one stream to another. For example 12<sup>th</sup> Science passed student can take admission to Science, Arts and Commerce streams. 12<sup>th</sup> Commerce passed students can take admission to Commerce and Arts streams while the student who has passed 12<sup>th</sup> Arts has the Academic flexibility to opt for various optional subjects prescribe for Arts stream.

#### c) Interdisciplinary Courses:

Environment Awareness course is compulsory for the second year students of B.A., B. Com. and B.Sc. In addition to this, the college runs distance education course of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (Nashik) for B.A. and B.Com. faculties.

#### d) Enrichment Programme:

College organizes the course of soft skills development. The various departments of college organize seminars, group discussion and workshops. In addition to this Field visits, Study tour and Slide show on various subjects are organized by the department for the enrichment of students knowledge

1.2.4 Does the Institution offer any self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification and salary etc.:

Yes, Institute offers self-finance (non-aided) programmes M.A.(Hindi, Marathi) and M.Com at Postgraduate level as demanded by students and stake holders. Admissions are given as per the norms laid down by the Government of Maharashtra and the University of Pune. Curriculum is set up by affiliating University. Fee structure is decided by our Institution Mahatma Gandhi Vidyamandir. As these courses are self-financed, (without any aid from State Government) the fee charged higher than that of regular financed courses but not more than Govt. guidelines to cover the remuneration for the faculty of the self-financed stream.

SC, ST and OBC students of both aided and unaided programmes are eligible for fee concessions and stipend as the case may be. Scholarships and free-ships are available for deserving students irrespective of caste or community. Highly qualified and meritorious candidates with a good research potential are appointed on regular/contractual basis as per UGC/State Government norms to teach these specialized courses and give a boost to research activities. Salary: As per UGC/ State Government norms. Besides these courses of affiliating University College also conducts self financing courses for Distance education of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University, Nashik.

1.2.4 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes relevant to regional and global employment markets? if 'yes', provide details of such programmes and the beneficiaries.

Presently the college does not have advantage of such provision, yet interested students are guided and counselled for MPSC, UPSC and other competitive exams.

1.2.5 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face—to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses /combination of their choice" if 'yes' how does the Institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

Yes, there is flexibility of combining conventional and other courses so that students can take admission to distance mode of education at Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU), Nasik in our college. The contact center for YCMOU at our college was established in the academic year 1992. This provides B.A. educational facility to those individual who are deprived from the education due to socio-economical or any other reasons. University of Pune also provides Distance Mode Programmes.Extending expansion of education towards masses.

- To make distant education available to the needy
- > To figure out the needs of disadvantaged sections
- ➤ Helping adults to acquire new learning skills

#### 1.3 Curriculum enrichment:

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the Institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The College being affiliated to the University does not have the option of formulating its own curriculum. Still, the courses offered have their relevance to the institutional goals and objectives (Majority of UG /PG Programs are job oriented). The college aims to inculcate the highest intellectual standards through rigorous academic commitment and discipline. Students are inspired to aspire for higher level of academic achievement by mastering the subject chosen to study.

The institution strives towards overall development of students and quality enhancement of learners through various aspects of holistic, personality development, orientation programs and life skill enrichment programs conducted during their period of studies that focuses on managerial skills, communication skills, leadership qualities, analytical skills, etiquettes, group discussion, global warming, awareness on environment through guest lecture, moral and ethical values, role and scope of women in uplifting the society.

The College ensures that the University curriculum is followed in the best of the spirit. The College academic calendar is prepared every session with the active involvement of the College Examination Committee and Heads of the Departments. The Principal makes sure that the curriculum framed by the University is supplemented in such a way that it reflects the mission and vision of the Institution. Regular feedback obtained from the stakeholders, with respect to the quality of the enrichment programmes, are monitored and evaluated by the IQAC and necessary remedial measures are incorporated in the future.

The institute provides necessary funds for upgrading the instruments for students and researchers, construction of new buildings, purchase of reference books and journals, internet facilities to departments which supplement the curriculum to meet the goals and objectives.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the Institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment markets?

The College, being affiliated to the University, does not have the option of formulating its own curriculum. Nevertheless, a sincere effort is made to modify and enrich the curriculum to suit the intellectual requirements of students in the fast paced life through the involvement of faculty, department and other stakeholders.

Faculty Members, who are on Board of Studies /Participated in curriculum design work shops take initiative to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum. As per UGC guidelines, teachers of our college, who are on Board of Studies/Participated in syllabus framing and Board of Examinations

have stressed the need to study Environment Science in terms of relevance to regional and global needs.

The college has taken measures to cater to the global market needs based on the true assessment of strength and services offered in the campus. To develop the required skills, brain storming sessions are held among for the faculty to design the tools in the areas of spoken English, use of computers and providing in-depth knowledge in the respective subjects.

# 1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the Institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as gender, climate change, environmental education human rights, I.C.T. etc. in to the curriculum?

Our college has always actively responded to the momentous issues of our society and socio-political environment of the world. To integrate the cross cutting issues like gender, climate change, environment education, human rights, ICT etc. positively into the curriculum.

**Climate Change:** The lectures on Biodiversity and its conservation, Global warming, Ozone layer depletion and Carbon emission organized to spread the message among the students.

**Environmental Education**: The University has prescribed subject 'Environment Awareness' at second year graduate level. Lectures, study tours and projects activities conducted under this programme to aware the students about environment. The College celebrates World Environment Day, Earth Day, Ozone Day and other important days to drive home the significance of environment. In order to aware with the environmental awareness, the college has organized various study tours in last four years are as follws:

**Human rights**: Anti-Ragging cell and Grievance Redressal Cell is active in the college campus. The NSS department organises various programmes to create awareness about evils of sex determination and terminating foetus of girl child, evils of smoking, chewing tobacco, tree plantation and women empowerment etc.

**ICT:** In syllabus of Science and Commerce courses, use of information and chnology is included, which helps the student to compete global employment market

## 1.3.4 What are the various value added courses /enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

The college does not offer such courses especially to the students as it is not an autonomous college however the college conducts the programmes as.

#### Moral and ethical values:

Rallies on female foeticides, dowry system, environmental issues, women empowerment etc. inculcates value education and cater to the holistic development of the students.

#### **Employable and life skills:**

The College conducts the ten days workshops on soft skills development programme for the final year students.(One batch of 50 students). The college organizes lectures on carrier guidance to increase the competitive approach among the students.

#### **Community orientation:**

Institution regularly organizes Blood Donation Camp, AIDS awareness, Drug abuse, Environmental awareness programmes in collaboration with NSS, Rotary Club and Lions Club to instil social consciousness among students. Other social outreach activities like distribution of stationary materials to the poor students and fruits to the patients admitted in civil hospital, on the occasion of birth anniversary of Founder members of institutions are regularly conducted in the locality.

## 1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of the use of the feedback from stakeholder in enriching the curriculum?

The college network with the stakeholders to collect and document responses on curriculum from the stakeholders. The students express their opinion on curriculum through response sheets/ feedback. Feedback from Parents on curriculum, placement, trends and teaching methodology is obtained during Parent-Teacher Meeting sessions. Responses on curriculum are also collected from Alumni, peers, and industry. The IQAC analyses feedback and prepares response chart for future use by the Principal. The feedback thus obtained is communicated to the University for Appropriate Action through the faculty members who are part of the Board of studies & Board of Examiners in the particular faculty in the University.

The feedback has been utilized in enriching the curriculum in the following manner:

- ➤ The present syllabi of Commerce, Chemistry, Botany and Zoology are based on Market-Industry needs.
- ➤ Masters in Commerce and Arts are introduced to meet the demand of stakeholders.
- ➤ Inclusion of project work in the curriculum to enable students to have a better grasp about the industry requirements.

## 1.3.6 How does the Institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

- A meeting among the Heads of the Departments and Professors is arranged on the yearly planning of syllabus enforcement.
- ➤ To prepared a subject wise list of the students with the help of office personnel.
- ➤ To arrange fruitful discussion among teachers on Time-table, functions of different committee, Annual planning of examinations.
- ➤ To display on notice board the information related to N.S.S. and N.C.C. debate competition, Earn and Learn scheme, exam time-table, results etc.
- ➤ Developing personal contacts with students to enlighten regarding curricular and extracurricular activity.
- > Students feedback is collected.

#### 1.4 Feedback System

## 1.4.1 What are the contributions of the Institutions in the design and Development of the curriculum prepared by the university?

- ➤ The University statutory bodies like Board of Studies (BOS) design syllabi. Experienced staff members are involved in procedures of curriculum design.
- ➤ Institution staff members also actively participate in workshops of curriculum design.
- ➤ The inputs of the staff, students and peers are communicated to the B.O.S.members. The syllabus has been revising on the fruitful suggestion made by the faculty members as well as students.

- Yes, the Institution committee member obtains feedback from students and the stakeholders and collects the document responses on curriculum.

- ➤ The IQAC analyses feedback and prepares response chart for future use by the Principal.

- ➤ The feedback thus obtained is communicated to the University for appropriate action through the faculty members who are part of the Board of studies & Board of Examiners in the particular faculty in the University.
- 1.4.3 How many new programmes /courses the Institution during the last four years introduces us? What was the rational for introducing new courses /programmes?
  - ➤ The demand of the rural students to get P.G. education is very acute. To cater the need of students, the institution has started P.G. course in Hindi from the academic year 2007-2008. As a result of this many of the students have completed their P.G. education.

#### **Criterion II**

#### **Teaching Learning and Evaluation**

#### 2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile.

- 2.1.1 How does college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission Process?
  - a) **Prospectus:** The institution ensures publicity with its prospectus which is published every new academic year. The prospectus provides all the details of undergraduate and postgraduate courses. It also provides information of additional courses and facilities guiding parents and students for the right option.
  - **b) College Website:** The institution furnishes admission related information on its updated website <a href="www.mgv.org.in/manmadcollege">www.mgv.org.in/manmadcollege</a> to attract more students.
  - c) Advertisement in Regional/National: Besides these canvassing techniques the institution takes help of mass media in flashing admission related advertisement in local newspapers.

#### d) Any other activities:

- ➤ Well-planned admission programme is displayed on notice-board of the institution.
- Admission canvassing is also being done through hoardings; flex boards etc. at the public places.
- ➤ Prospective students in the vicinity are searched out and counselled by the faculty members of the institution.
- > The information about the institution and the availability of the courses is communicated through pamphlets.
- 2.1.2 Explain in details the criteria adopted and process of admission Ex.(i)merit(ii)common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies. (iii)Combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other to various programmes of Institutions.

After declaration of HSC examination results, the admission process is made open for UG courses. Details of every available course options, number of seats available and criteria for admission are displayed on notice board of the college. Merit forms are collected from eligible candidates. Merit list is prepared as per the norms directed by State Government and University and displayed on the college website.

The college has constituted an admission committee. Vice-Principal and HODs are involved in the admission process, for selection of eligible students on the basis of merit-cum-reservation. The committee scrutinizes the applications for admission with respect to fulfillment of the eligibility criteria prescribed for admission by the University of Pune

For General courses, the cut off percentage for admission at the entry level is as prescribed by the university norms. Our mission is to provide: the benefit of education to the underprivileged and marginalized sections. There is no merit percentage for admission at the entry level.

Cut off percentage for admission varies depending on courses, for F.Y.B.A. 35%, F.Y.B.Com. 35% and F.Y.B.Sc. 35%. For M.A. and M.Com. admissions are given on merit basis. For students belonging to reservation category 5% relaxation for UG and PG courses is followed as per the Government and University norms.

# 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

For the Admission at the Undergraduate and Postgraduate level, the Institution prepares a merit list as per the norms laid down by the University and the State Government and displays the same on the notice board. For undergraduate admissions, students passing and securing minimum 35% marks in XII class are given admission in the first year of B.A, B.Com and B.Sc.courses.

## 2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the Institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If yes what is the outcomes of such an effort and how it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, the institution has a mechanism to review the admission process and student profile annually. Admission Process has been automated and the profile of the students admitted is obtained from the office of college. Our admission committee makes an analytical study about their academic background and economic status from the statistical data (number and composition of the candidates applied and admitted in the undergraduate programme) obtained.

The departments whose programmes are in high demand are encouraged to consider starting additional divisions on no-grant basis whereas those with very low demand are directed to take extra measures to enhance their enrolment. In this process, a few departments like Social Sciences and English have widened their scope and publicity mechanism, and thereby succeeded in augmenting the quantity and quality of their enrolment.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase /improved access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the Institution and its student profiles demonstrate /reflect the national commitment to diversity and inclusion.

**SC/ST:** As per the statutory provisions seats are kept reserved for the disadvantaged community. Students are counselled by the Reservation cell of the college regarding academic structure, fees, and financial provisions which helps facilitate admission process.

**OBC**: OBC students are also benefitted through GOI scholarship. In this category most of the students come from rural area. The college facilitate them for travel concession from MSRTC and Indian Railway.

**Women:** Out of the total enrollment of the college, almost 50% enrollment is of women students. Our college is situated amidst the high percentage of SC and NT population where GOI Scholarship and Savitribai Phule scholarship are provided to girls belonging to this category. Within short period of time, Hostel facility will be made available in the campus, which will promote admission to women students.

**Differently-abled:** As per statutory provisions some seats are kept reserved for differently abled students. Special infrastructural facilities like ramps, toilet on the ground floor etc. are provided alongwith concession in fees and special scholarships.

**Economically weaker Sections:** Students who belong to economically backward class get concession in fees according to the state government rules. They are allowed to pay fees in installments. They are provided with scholarships and other empowerment schemes like earn while learn. Some financial help is also provided to these students from the Poor Boys Fund (PBF).

**Minority Community:** The institution is situated in multicultural city which has Railway junction. Many students are from minority background seeking admission in our college. We are facilitating them for minority scholarships from Government of Maharashtra.

**Any others:** For the sports personnel, the college organizes a supplementary examination if required due to their participation in various competitions during regular schedule of examinations.

#### **2.2** Catering to Students Diverse Needs:

### 2.2.1 How does the Institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to Government policies in this regard?

The college provides amenities and concessions to differently abled students as follow:

- Physically challenged students are given admission in the institution as per the University and Govt. norms.
- ➤ Physically challenged students are allotted extra time in University examination by providing special seating arrangement as per University examination rules.
- ➤ The provision of writer is made to such students at the time of examinations if needed as per norms.
- ➤ The institution has ramp facility for physically challenged students.
- ➤ The institution has a cultural circle for the promotion of the talent of physically challenged students.

## 2.2.2 Does the Institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the program? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, students fulfilling the eligibility norms prescribed by the University of Pune are enrolled for a particular course. Since majority of students are from rural area, the college provides special counselling to make them aware of the course contents and career opportunities. It is observed that many students lack fluency in English communicative skills as well as writing skills. To overcome these difficulties several programmes such as spoken English exercises, written composition-Essay writing, Letter writing etc. are arranged. Senior faculties are called upon to enlighten the students on the topics of Basic Skills/Syllabus, Structure Examination Pattern etc.

## 2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the Institution to bridge the Knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the program of their choice?

The institution has a board of student welfare established as per the guidelines of University of Pune. Remedial teaching is provided to the SC/ST students under special guidance scheme.

## 2.2.4 How does College sensitize its staff and students on issues such as Gender, Inclusion, Environment etc?

- ➤ The institution organizes different awareness programmes through lectures and workshops.
- ➤ NSS unit organizes rallies on issues such as AIDS, gender discrimination and environment.
- The institution has established grievances and sexual harassment committee to deal with the complaints of female students.
- ➤ At the second year level environment awareness programme is implemented.

- ➤ The NCC, NSS and Dept. of Botany organize tree plantation in the premises and in nearby adopted villages.
- ➤ Every year tree plantation programme is organized by the college in collaboration with Manmad Municipal Council and Dept. of Forest, Govt. of Maharashtra.
- > Students are sensitized in the issue of Environment protection during the winter camping of N.S.S.
- ➤ We have organized special lectures of Mr. Namade to aware the students about Water Harvesting.
- ➤ Dept. of Zoology in collaboration with Manmad Municipal Council developed vermi-compost unit and Gambusia fish breeding center.

### 2.2.5 How does the Institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

The institution has the mechanism to identify slow, average and advanced learners. It is done continuously through both internal and external evaluation. The internal evaluation is taken in the class by asking questions or through discussions following teaching sessions. The teacher tries to evaluate the degree of understanding of the students. This facilitates the teachers to identify advanced learners.

The external evaluation is done by the University evaluation programme. It includes oral tests, seminars, practical examination and annual examination at the end of the year. These methods of internal and external evaluation are very helpful to know the status of learners regarding their level of competence.

Advance learners are identified and guided accordingly. They are advised to go through more reference books on the same topic and use internet and other resources to increase knowledge. They are provided opportunities for independent study and also encouraged to participate in seminar, project (Aviskar), Madhava mathematics competition exam, and Chemiad exam. etc.

# 2.2.6 How does the Institution collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance of the students at risk of drop out (Students from disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The admission committee as well as examination committee collects the data of academic performance of the students from Office of the college. The data is analysed and the following remedial measures are taken:

- Remedial classes for disadvantaged sections of society and slow learners are organised.
- > Teachers conduct extra classes without any remuneration.
- > Scholarship of GOI, State Govt. and University are given to students from economically weaker sections.
- As per the demand of students, additional divisions of PG courses have been started in Marathi, Hindi and Commerce subjects.
- ➤ For admission in PG courses, concessions in installment of fees are provided to the economically deprived students.

#### 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

## 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The institution prepares the academic calendar at the outset of every academic year. The same calendar is to be published in the prospectus and website of college <a href="www.mgv.org.in/manmadcollege">www.mgv.org.in/manmadcollege</a> before the beginning of the academic programmes.

The academic calendar helps the students, parents and teachers to plan for their academic year. Each department in the college functions according to the annual and monthly teaching plan. The course plan is prepared at the department level.

Courses to be taught: The list of courses for the coming semester/ term is studied by the faculty of the department. Faculty is given the choice to select the courses based on their areas of interest.

**Course Allocation:** Based on the course preference list, the Head of the Department finalizes the course allocation for faculty members of the respective departments.

**Course Plan:** The course plan is made clear to reflect what the faculty is planning to do for the current semester / term. All the faculty members of the department prepare the monthly teaching plan for the respective courses.

**Time Table:** We have a timetable committee that sets up the Time- table for all faculties. In all programs the guidelines of university of Pune are followed. **Evaluation System:** The evaluation system for each course is fixed immediately after framing the syllabus. It is done by the Board of Studies of University of Pune and it is communicated to the students at the beginning of the year. Internal assessment has been introduced by university for Science faculty. It helps to promote attendance of students for regular lectures and practicals. For the Arts and Commerce faculty, centralized term-end examination is introduced by the Higher Management of the Institution.

**Supplementary Examination:** Failed students are given opportunities to appear for supplementary examination. The supplementary Term-end examination is conducted by the college and the annual supplementary examinamtion is conducted by the University during the months of October and November.

#### 2.3.2 How does IOAC contribute to improve the teaching - learning process?

The IQAC of the college has been constituted as per the norms of NAAC. It supports and provides conducive atmosphere for the following:

- ➤ Preparation of academic calendar for timely conduct and quality improvement of various activities of the college.
- ➤ Participating and supportive role in every event of the college including seminars / conferences conducted by various departments.
- ➤ Ensuring access to computers with internet facility are available at the department and college level, it being vigilant for timely instructions and directives of NAAC, UGC and University of Pune.
- ➤ Preparation and timely submission of AQAR at the end of every academic year.
- ➤ IQAC plan and executes application of quality parameters for various academic and administrative activities of the institution.

- ➤ Motivating faculty members periodically to attend programmes on new trends in their subjects.
- ➤ Feedback on Teachers is also obtained to assure the quality of teaching learning.
- ➤ Visual aids used to enhance teaching-learning.
- > Educational tours and field surveys organized to make teaching more effective.

# 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The learning is made student centric by adopting variations in teaching methods suited to the learning abilities of the students. In the classes where the strength is more, the lectures are delivered with the aim that average student will be able to assimilate the concept. It is always seen that institutional strategies help in overall development of students by achieving better knowledge. We always plan our activities to mould our students so that they can face this competitive world boldly. It is always seen by faculty that lecturing method suits to the level of understanding of the student. On demand, teachers conduct revision lectures for slow learners.

We have established well-equipped laboratories such as Science Labs., Language Lab. and Commerce Lab. These laboratories develop life skills and study skills of students. The students from Science faculty can handle sophisticated instruments, which help them to acquire knowledge about instrumentation. The language departments organize Quizzes, Magazine-designing, Creative Writing Competitions, Debates and Poetry competitions. In this way, Language laboratory is found useful to develop communication skills and also to teach different groups of students simultaneously according to their abilities.

The commerce laboratory helps the students to gain practical knowledge in commercial fields. We conduct value based education programs which help bring stability among students. It is necessary to acquire lifelong learning along with curricular courses. Group Activities like Group Discussion, Field work, Educational Tours, Projects, Surveys, Seminars at departmental level and guest lecture by experts facilitate students to develop their ability to learn on their own.

## 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The college promoted creativity amongst students by encouraging them to publish materials in the college magazine. A major publication of the institution is 'Avishkar' - the annual college magazine comprising Marathi, Hindi and English sections. During the academic years 2009-10 and 2010-11, the college has published special issues of Avishkar magazine on the subjects 'Water Scarcity' and 'Industrial Problems' respectively. This magazine enables our young writers to taste the excitement of having created something out of their imagination/intellect and provides them a platform for giving an expression to their creative urge. Creative endeavours like articles, stories, poems by students find a place of prominence in the magazine.

Creativity, Scientific temperament are also developed among the students by rational thinking , independent learning, poster making and exposure to the visit of Universities/Industries/Research Institutes /Sea shores and doing study projects.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

For effective teaching the institution has promoted the use of following modern Technologies:

- ➤ Charts, models, museum specimens, slide projectors, Paxiscope, over head projectors, are the teaching aids used by most of the department.
- ➤ Computers with UPS backup and internet facility to download and print study material are made available to the students in the Library, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Physics, Mathematics, Commerce and Language departments.
- ➤ LCD projectors are available in the departments of Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and this facility is extended to other departments also as per the demand of faculty.
- ➤ The College has institutional membership of <u>www.nlist.inflibnet.ac.in.</u> It is made available to faculty and students by providing indivisual login id and password.
- ➤ The Language laboratory in the English department makes use of linguaphones, TV, tape recorders to monitor the improvement in the recitation ability of the students.
- ➤ The learning process is made more effective by the use of e-books and e-journals.
- Every department has computer and internet facility for staff and students.

### 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- The institution organizes lectures of subject experts through various associations within the college such as Science Association, Literary Association and Commerce Association for the faculty and students to keep them updated about the latest developments in their subjects.
- ➤ The institution has promoted all the faculty members to make use of internet and computers for library resources like research journals, encyclopedia and new reference books. It keeps them updated with the recent developments. To satisfy the needs of students, they are also made to use computers.
- ➤ The institution organizes workshops/ seminars/ conferences for providing platform for updating knowledge in the relevant subject. The college also deputes students and faculty for attending programmes organized outside the college.
- Faculty members are encouraged to attend Orientation programs and Refresher courses for keeping themselves updated with recent developments in their subjects.
- Faculty members undertake Minor / Major Research projects from various funding agencies like UGC and BCUD to keep pace with global trends.

- Faculty members present research papers in seminars and conferences at State/ National / International level for which the financial assistance is given to them. The research findings are published in reputed Peer reviewed International and National journals.
- Research projects are given to the students of PG level to make them aware about recent developments and also encouraged to attend and present research papers in conferences.
- ➤ The institution organizes lectures of eminent scholars, scientists, professionals and subject experts through various associations of the college on the latest developments which help the students as well as faculty.
- ➤ The staff academy of the institution organizes lectures of faculty members in which latest trends in their subjects are exchanged with their colleagues.
- ➤ Collaboration with the Library of Pune University and INFLIBNET facility available in the library helps the faculty and students to make access to more of e-journals.
- ➤ Use of ICT helps for integrated instructional approach. ICT based programme supports for face to face interaction, instruction and update knowledge. This integrated mode of method gives best result in imparting the knowledge.
- ➤ Industrial visits and educational tours also help students to keep abreast of the latest developments. Students participation in symposium / seminar conducted by the college and other institutions.

## 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

**Academic support:** The faculty is always ready to strive hard for the students by providing valuable guidance regarding syllabus. It improves their academic performance. Students are motivated to refer extra study material like question banks, paper solutions, question paper formats.

**Personal and psycho-social support:** The personal difficulties or dilemmas of the students are systematically tackled with and solved by the faculty.

#### Faculty also provides guidance services through:

Career Guidance and Counseling Cell: A Counseling Cell has been established in the institution for academic counseling.

#### The faculty also participates in personal counseling:

- > To help students to chalk out academic roadmaps for themselves.
- > To enable students to integrate themselves with the milieu.
- > To acquaint them with various career options through seminars.
- ➤ To address problems related to stress, anxiety, examination phobia, peer pressure and adjustment to changed environment.

#### **Mentoring:**

- ➤ To develop leadership, teamwork, co-operation, hard work, creativity.
- Faculty mentors through N.S.S., N.C.C., Sports and Cultural activities.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Innovative teaching methods have been adopted by the faculty to boost the capacity to learn and to teach meaningful application of knowledge to young minds. The institution encourages the faculty to complement the academic system with practical skills through various teaching methodologies that extend beyond the classrooms. Multifarious activities in almost all the practical subjects are integrated into the academic agenda.

#### **Activities undertaken:**

- ➤ Power Point Presentations and use of internet to make teaching-learning more interactive and interesting
- ➤ Socio-economic surveys, Field and Educational trips
- ➤ Visits to industrial/cooperative housing institution.
- > State level seminars and conferences organized
- Workshops and extension lectures by great scholars and subject experts.
- ➤ Hands-on work experience in almost all the practical subjects are integrated into the academic agenda.
- ➤ ICT based teaching methods are used for required theory and practical topics as per University syllabus.
- ➤ Internet videos of selective topics used to teach 3-D structures in Chemistry and Zoology subjects.
- ➤ Help of models and experimental kits are taken to explain certain concepts.
- > Feedback on lectures obtained from students.
- ➤ To encourage the visit to library, students are also given assignments which they complete using books from library.
- > Special classes are held for slow learners and advanced learners.
- > Centralized term end examination at Institute level.
- ➤ Centralized CAP and cross examination for the assessment work.

### 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching- learning process?

The institution has a large number of books in the central library including text books, Reference Book, Journals/ Periodicals, Encyclopedia etc. The books in the central library are categorized as Reference/Reserve books. There is Book-bank facility to cater exclusively to the needs of the underprivileged students and are issued for one semester/year. Books for Competitive Examinations are issued to the students. Computers along with printer, xerox machine and library software are installed. Broadband Internet facility (01 node) is provided by which e-resources are hosted through INFLIBNET services. The Librarian helps the departments to purchase the latest edition of the books as per the requirement of the teachers. The reprographic facility is provided to the students and the faculty in the college.

The institution has a number of CDs and VCDs being used for classroom teaching. E-library facility is a source of vast study material which is used by teachers as reference material. The books recommended by teachers are purchased by the management for the college Library. The reading habits among students are cultivated by teachers by quoting several references from different books.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the Curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

- ➤ The Institution has built-in mechanisms to ensure curriculum completion within the planned time frame.
- ➤ Constant monitoring by the Principal, Vice-Principal and Head of Department to ensure effective implementation of the teaching plans.
- ➤ However, the institution faces a few challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame in certain circumstances.
- ➤ The provision of additional working days in the college Calendar helps the college to manage this challenge effectively.
- ➤ Teacher absence for long periods either due to medical, participation in orientation/refresher courses or any other reasons also creates difficulties in completing the curriculum within the scheduled time.
- ➤ The management ensures proper arrangement for the completion of the curriculum through substitute teachers. Faculty members take extra classes for the completion of courses.

### 2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching-learning?

The institute monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning, by collecting the information from students in the feedback format, distributed to the students. Evaluation of the teachers by students is done every year.

The feedback forms are scrutinized by the Principal, Vice-Principals, HODs, Chairman of IQAC and members of the feedback committee to assess the teachers overall preparation, communication skills, ability to motivate students, use of teaching methods, regularity in teaching and assessment, impartial attitude in assessment, student centric approach etc. The personal and informal feedback or suggestions from students are taken into account towards improvement in teaching-learning.

Accordingly, feedback results are communicated to the concerned teachers. The teachers with better response of students regarding knowledge, presentation and interaction with the students are appreciated. Feedback forms of the teacher are scrutinized by the committee and teacher is honoured as 'Best Teacher of the Year' during annual social gathering. Those who have a lesser degree of these are councelled for improvement.

The management deputes faculty to National and International Conferences, Seminars and Workshops. Besides this, the faculty is granted study leave for faculty development training programs like Refresher or Orientation courses, Short term courses and other training programs like NSS, NCC, Soft-skill and Disaster Management.

## b) Faculty Training programs are organized by the Institution to empower and enable the use of various tools and technology for improved teaching-learning:

**Teaching-Learning methods/approaches:** The institution provides Information Communication Technology for effective teaching learning. Internet facility is also made available freely for teachers and the taughts. L.C.D., model, charts, CDs are used for effective teaching and learning. Field visits and Industrial visits are organized for practical oriented course. The college has organized a comprehensive workshop exclusively for teachers in which the session on use of computer aided technology were taken by the

experts. These practices are adopted in teaching by majority of staff members depending upon the nature of subject.

Handling new curriculum: New curriculum and other changes are conveyed by Principal to HODs who explain the changes to other teachers. College deputes faculty to participate in syllabus training programs. Purchase of the text, reference books and internet facility. Our faculty members Dr. T. S. Savale, Mr. S. R. Deore, Dr. J. D. Vasait, Dr. D. G. Jadhav, Mr. S. M. Bhoye, Mr. W. K. Gagare, Mr. S. U. Deore, Mr. K. K. Bachhav, Dr. G. L. Shendge, Mr. N. B. Bachhav, Dr. B. S. Desale, Mr. S. D. Mohan actively participated in designing new curriculum.

**Content/knowledge management:** Our faculty members prepare yearly teaching plan. Yearly syllabus completion reports are submitted to the Institution.

**Selection, development and use of enrichment materials:** The institution has a purchase committee which recommends to Management the selection and purchase of necessary teaching aids for effective teaching and learning. Training regarding use of internet and how to prepare power point presentations and accessing of e-journals is provided by faculty members of Physics and Library dept.

**Assessment:** The Examination Department of the college sends the internal and term end examination marks to University by using online process. Faculty members of the institution are appointed, as examiners / moderators / coordinators by the University for Assessment of theory and practical examinations. For term-end examination, paper setter / examiners are appointed by Board of Examination on the Institution level.

Cross cutting issues: Environment related activities held in the institution are through Botany Department, especially Sibling Plantation, Environment Awareness Campaigns and conservation of rare and endangered species of plants.

**Audio Visual Aids/multimedia:** Training programmes are organised by library department from time to time for use of multimedia projector, use of language lab. etc.

**OER's Open Educational Resources:** Teachers make use of Internet facility to access e-journal through inflibnet and website of HRD ministry.

**Teaching learning material development, selection and use:** The institution has a purchase committee to buy the necessary teaching aids for effective teaching and learning. Faculties as well as students develop teaching aids like charts, models, power point technique. For enrichment of library, laboratories, Gymkhana, Office and Exam section, the Institution strives hard for excellence.

- ➤ Organizing Guest lectures in various upcoming areas in different disciplines for faculty.
- ➤ Providing support for attending international conferences to the faculty.

The institution has the distinction of having on its staff outstanding scholars whose erudition has been recognized at National and State level and added a new dimension to the reputation of the college. ## 2.4.6 Has the Institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes, the institution has adopted a proforma to evaluate teachers by students. The proforma based on NAAC recommendations has been designed to seek suggestions of our students.

This proforma is filled up by the students who evaluate their respective teachers on the basis of their teaching style, methodology, pedagogic skills and their interaction level. (The secrecy of this exercise is fully maintained). The feedback is analyzed by the Principal and corrective measures taken to enhance teaching-learning.

#### **2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms:**

### 2.5.1 How does the Institution ensure that the stakeholders of the Institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

Actually, the evaluation process is framed by University of Pune. However, the institution ensures that stakeholders especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation process by following methods:

- Principal's address to the students.
- Faculty meeting with Principal.
- Parents meet.
- > Public-address system.

- ➤ Display boards/ notice board.
- Faculty members acquaint the students about exam system.
- ➤ The circulars and GR's from the Government, University and institution are served via emails, notices and oral medium.
- Examination information is displayed on college website <u>www.mgv.org.in/</u> manmadcollege.

## 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the Institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the Institution on its own?

The University has introduced the major evaluation reforms like:

- For the First Year University has introduced 80+20 pattern from the academic year 2002-03.
- Question papers are set by the University. The Time-table is displayed by the University. Exams are conducted by the Institution and results are declared as per University guidelines.
- For Second Year and Third year of B.Sc. there is semester system (40 marks for University and 10 marks internal) pattern from the academic year 2003-2004 and 2004-2005 respectively.
- For Second Year and Third year of B.Com there is annual pattern (80 marks University and 20 marks for term end examination) from the academic year 2002-03.
- ➤ For Second year and third year of B.A. there is annual pattern (80 marks University and 20 marks for term end examination) from the academic year 2003-04.
- For the PG courses there is semester pattern (80 marks University and 20 marks for internal assessment) from the academic year 2008-09.

The institution has also adopted a centralized Term-End examination pattern framed and implemented by its mother Institute Mahatma Gandhi Vidyamandir since 2007-08. It is our significant reform in the examination system where, question paper setting is common and to check the unfair means in the term end examination the supervisors on duty have been swapped among different colleges.

## 2.5.3 How does the Institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the Institution on its own?

The norms of the evaluation reforms decided by the University of Pune are mandatory for all the affiliated colleges to follow. The institution takes proper care of the effective implementation of evaluation reforms.

Institution has appointed a Chief Examination Officer (CEO) as per directives of University of Pune for the effective implementation of examination system. However, the institution has also constituted examination committee headed by the Principal. They prepare the academic calendar of exam for the conduction of tests, tutorials, midterm exam, term end exam, practical exam, oral exam and annual exam. The committee conducts the first year annual exam in college as per the time table displayed by University. Other work like conducting exam, paper checking, declaration of result and grievances regarding the exams are collected and sent to University examination section.

- The emphasis has been given on the continuous assessment of students through tutorials, class tests, orals, seminars and project assignments.
- ➤ Practical course has been introduced for Mathematics in Science faculty from academic year 2009-10.
- > Oral examination for languages and Commerce subjects is introduced.

To ensure transparency in the evaluation system the University of Pune vides ref. No. Exam/SR/2008, dated 16<sup>th</sup> May 2008 has implemented the scheme of providing Xerox Copies of answer sheets of any subject to the students on demand.

## 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The institution adopts Formative and Summative evaluation approaches to measure students achievement in a programme. Formative evaluation designed to test the cognitive skills of the students. It is based on tests, assignments, quiz, field trip reports, seminars, term papers, residential camps of NSS, NCC and practicals. Continuous internal assessment having 20% weightage as compared to 80% summative evaluation ensures regularity in Laboratories for practical. It makes the students innovative and also improves their performance in the annual examination.

#### **Impact on the System:**

Motivated by this system, the students of Science have undertaken innovative research projects and prepared models. Students of Geography have taken up case studies. It orients the students towards research and participating in a research event AVISHKAR organized by University of Pune.

# 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

The rigor in the examination is ensured by the institution introducing new methodology for assessment. For example, objective questions, narration skills, multiple choice questions, latest information. The internal assessment of the institution includes praticals, tutorials, project works. The institution introduced soft skill development programme, personality development programme and ICT programme.

## 2.5.6 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

After declaration of results, if there are any grievance, students are asked to give it in writing in prescribed format. If this is concerned with college internal examination evaluation, the complaints are sent to examination department and they are asked to solve the difficulties and problems.

If the grievance is regarding University examination, applications in prescribed format are sent to university authorities for proper action. Our examination department takes follow-up regarding all concerned matters.

#### **2.6** Students performance and Learning Outcomes:

### 2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, every programme has its learning outcomes clearly stated and these learning outcomes are set in unmistakable terms by the University. It functions as preface to the syllabus or curriculum. The staff and the students therefore are well informed of these outcomes even before the commencement of teaching or learning the syllabus.

A copy of the expected learning outcome along with the syllabus is handed over to each faculty and student and it is also displayed on website for the convenience of stakeholders.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the student's results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

The progress and performance of the students through the duration of the course is communicated to them orally in the classes during lectures by the respective teachers of each faculty. After the declaration of the University results, each department of all faculties prepares a separate record of their own, every year. Then the analysis of the said result is done by the faculty members. The institution gives instructions to the respective teachers of each faculty in this regard.

## 2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

To achieve learning outcomes, the Institution has specified structure as follows:

- Compulsion of attendance: The students are instructed for compulsory attendance so that they get the maximum impact of teaching interms of their understanding of the subject
- Frequent revision: The teacher, who has organized his teaching in the form of teaching plan, plans his daily teaching. In the last five minutes of the lecture, important points and ideas are highlighted with the intention

- that, students should grasp the specific topic thoroughly.
- Addressing Difficulties: the Head of the Department holds constant discourse with the students wherein he looks into the difficulties and querries of the students regarding understanding of the topics, references of texts and their availability. It is solved with the satisfaction of the students.
- ➤ Organizing Guest lectures: in order to unfold and perceive the clarity of understanding of difficult topics in the syllabus the guest lecture is organized by inviting a specific expertise.
- ➤ Strategic Organizing of Time-table: The time-table of the faculty is prepared in such a way that, the administration of the college easily points out whether the lecture was conducted or not. In a specific column in the time-table, there is a mention of name of teacher, paper, time and hall number. Through this the students are constantly in touch with the syllabus, the learning process and its overall orientation.
- ➤ Using relevance of the actual world of living (for Humanities, Commerce and Science): The teacher teaching a specific paper of a subject gives references of the actual relevance taking place outside the texts. It concretizes the learning experience and thereby removes haziness in understanding, which can probably form only by learning the text matter.
- 2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The traditional courses have limited scope in the age of globalization. Despite the fact, we are committed to provide quality education to get a quality job.

The institution organizes industrial visits every year for the students of all faculties- such as- visit to various laboratories, banks, share markets, language lab, sugar factories, milk dairies; etc. Due to these visits, the spirit of entrepreneurship is inculcated among the students. The students of NCC department have availed job opportunities in Indian Army, Maharashtra Police, SRP, BSF, CRPF, GRP. A course in Environmental Studies at the SYBA/SYB.Com/S.Y.B.Sc. creates the research aptitude among the students. Faculty are motivating and guiding the students for participating in a research competition "AVISHKAR" to inculcate research aptitude.

- 2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?
  - ➤ Teaching Feedback: the teacher teaching a particular paper often takes feedback of students. Out of total strength of students in the class, he analyses as to how many students grasped the topic and how many without it. It makes him review his own teaching methods and orient the students for their commitment to the subject.
  - ➤ Specific Procedure of working out Annual Results: the University results of the college are analysed classwise, subjectwise and departmentwise. The actual tabulation of these results in terms of number of students in pass class, second class, first class, failed and absent gives a clear view of the situation of the performance of the students.

- ➤ Organizing various competitions: The different committees in the college organize competition such as essay, elocution, debating and others showing skill performances. Score sheets of these competitions best serve the basis for data that shows high performance and low performance of the students.
  - ❖ The analysis of the results shows extra efforts to be taken by the faculty and the administration and the need of strategies for maximum involvement of students in academic stream created by the institution. It is used as input for the next year.

### 2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

In order to do planning and overcome barriers of learning, senior faculty serves as basic tool for collecting and analyzing data on student learning outcome. The institution conducts various programs, tests, seminars, workshops, group discussions, laboratory practicals etc for better learning of the students of all faculties.

- 2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.
  - ➤ The teachers find different ways to document students records effectively in terms of their responses to various evaluation procedures and outcomes.
  - Assignments are given to the students to induce a self-learning habit and are checked by the teacher after a given time and graded.
  - > Seminars on the various important topics of the subject are conducted and evaluated through grading.
  - ➤ Class tests are conducted unitwise or weekly to check if the student has been grasping the subject well or need special attention. Teacher checks the tests and keep the record of the marks gained by the student in register.
  - After the syllabus is completed, the teachers give the format of the question paper of the forthcoming examination. It is discussed thoroughly.
  - ➤ The teacher guides the students for solving the question papers in the classroom itself. It increases their awareness about attempting the exams and the need to gain the exact areas of the knowledge. Ultimately it improves the performance of even low performing students.

The Dept. of Zoology organized free of cost blood group examination for the students. The institution also calls free medical check-up and consultation for the students in collaboration with the medical College team.

#### 3.6 Extension Activity:

## 3.6.1 How does the Institution promote Institution-neighborhood community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

The institution neighborhood network is promoted by organizing seminars, workshops, lecture series and various competitions. In such programmes the society gets participated to establish interaction between themselves and the students. The activities like Samarth Bharat Abhiyan, Disaster management, Adult Literacy etc. are run in the neighborhood. Some other activities like sibling plantation, cleanliness drive, information regarding preventing diseases (AIDS) etc. are given to the neighborhood through N.S.S. winter camp. The Institution organizes rallies of students in neighborhood to raise social awareness about social evils and moral values. These help the students to acquire and develop the attitude for social service and training.

The institution also organizes book exhibition every year for students and staff. NSS Camp at Bhadane village our students work hard for overall development of the village including excavating mud from the earthen dam that is the only source of drinking water.

In cultural programme the students and faculty members consider a programme on Evils of dowry, Drug addiction, Anti superstition, Women empowerment, Self help group, right to information and right to education for creating awareness among the society.

- ➤ Various committees are formed in the new academic year. The committees conduct various extension activities which displayed on notice board.
- > The committee members prepared action plan for the academic year.
- > The committees organized experts lectures.
- ➤ The Student Welfare Officer (SWO) looks after the details of various announcements and brought the same to the notice of the students.
- ➤ The committees also made provisions for funds.

## 3.6.3 How does the Institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the Institution?

Annual meetings are arranged among Parents and Alumni. The feedback of all the concerned is taken for further improvement in the function of the institution. The suggestions and the observations of stakeholders are taken into consideration Students feedback is welcomed when they leave the institution.

- 3.6.4 How does the Institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Provide the budgetary details for last four years, List the major extension and outreach programmers and their impact on the overall development of students.
  - For the smooth functioning of extension activities the division of work is being made among various committees.
  - ➤ The institution takes help of University, NGO's and other Institutions such as KBH Dental College, Lions Club, Jai Bhavani Sports Club and Arpan Blood Bank for conducting extension activities.
  - ➤ The financial assistance is provided for all activities as per their requirements.
  - At the commencement of new academic year, information related to different schemes is provided to the students. Budget and annual plans are submitted by the committees to the institution. The University organizes workshops every year for NSS and overall Quality Improvement Programmes. The programme Coordinators participate in the workshop and execute ideas of the programme at the institutional level.
  - ➤ The Institution receives Government and University grants for the extension activities. State Government and University grants are utilised every year to run these activities.
  - All this financial assistance received through University is as follows:
  - **I. N.S.S.:** a) Annually total amount of Rs. 52500/- sanctioned for 250 volunteers. (Rs. 210/- per volunteer) for regular activities.
  - b) For Special Winter Camp total amount of Rs. 73750/- sanctioned for 125 volunteers (Rs. 590/- per volunteer: Rs. 450/- paid by central & state govt + Rs.140 paid by University of Pune).
  - **II. N.C.C.:** The N.C.C. unit receives Rs 660/- per cadet per year as refreshment and washing allowance, which is disbursed by the battalion. Total cadets  $53 \times 660$  per cadet = 34980/- per year.
- 3.6.5 How does the Institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/International agencies?

The institution implements following activities to create social awareness, patriotism and to promote good citizenship among the college students.

- 1) National Service Scheme: Under this scheme two hundred 50 students are enrolled each year, out of which almost 50 % students participate in special winter camp. Some selected students participate in various camps and workshops organized at various levels.
- 2) NCC: There is N.C.C. unit in the college. The capacity of each unit is fifty three cadets. The N.C.C. cadets participate in regular parade, training programmes and camps organized by the Battalion. N.C.C. cadets also participate in the progrmmes such as Sibling Plantation, Pulse-Polio Vaccination, Rasta Suraksha Saptah, Gram Swachhata Abhiyan etc.
- 3) **Board of student welfare**: Under this board student council is ormed and various activities are conducted for the social, political awareness of students. Through these activities institution tries to inculcate social, cultural values among the students and create affection, commitment towards the Nation.
- 4) The Institution promotes participation of students and faculty in extension activities such as N.S.S., N.C.C, Cultural Activities, Sports, Extra Curricular Activities, Yuva Saptah, Avishkar Competition, Annual variety entertainment competition, Celebration of Various Festivals and Days, Sibling Plantation, Women Empowerment, Science Exhibitions, celebration of various days, Pulse-Polio immunization Programme, Observance of Traffic Control week, AIDS Awareness week etc. Different sports events are organized in collaboration with Jai Bhavani Sports Club. Such as weight lifting competition for different age group students.

  - N.S.S. implemented the Campaign "Gram Swachhta Abhiyan" in the village Bhadane continuously for three years. Bhadane village received Gadge Baba Gram swachhta Abhiyan award given by Zilha Parishad Nashik. Students of Geography of the college conducted village survey of Bhadane, Tal. Chandwad Dist. Nashik.
  - The institution has a study centre of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University for educationally disadvantaged people.
  - > Department of Chemistry organized Water Testing & Pollution load distribution programme, which was very useful to the residing people in Manmad city.
  - > The department of Zoology prepared Vermi-Compost fertilizer in its Vermiculture shed.

Soft Skills Development programme organized by college for last five years)
- ➤ The NSS Department organized Workshop on Value Education, village survey, awareness about health education, water pollution on 09/10/2008 at Nimon Tal.Chandwad, on 12/07/2009 at Daregaon Tal. Chandwad and on 17/09/2011 at Shingve Tal. Chandwad there are 150 students participated in it.
- ➤ Environmental awareness is a mandatory subject for the second year of under graduate courses.
- ➤ The students participating in N.S.S., N.C.C. and Sports activity get additional five marks by the university under ordinance 163.

The institution makes involvement of community by arranging different functions. The institution has a Local Managing Committee which is fully involved in extension activities. The involvement of local community gets an opportunity to observe the activities like winter camp, parents meetings, Alumni association meetings, various days celebration etc. Whenever the local communities visit the college they discuss the issues regarding extension and development of the college. As a result of this the local community becomes active for extension and development of the institution.

The Institution is involved in extension activities through Gram Swachhata Abhiyan. Under the NSS programme in Bhadane village and activities like sibling plantation, dowry prohibition, prohibition of alcohol consumption, village cleanliness drive, water pollution awareness, literacy drive, health and hygiene, information of government schemes, personality development programme, water harvesting, Lek Ladki Abhiyan, , family survey for them were organized. The institution holds meeting among students, parents, teachers and member of the Vidyamandir family every year and takes the feedback and suggestion from all. This helps for the Institutional development.

- ➤ The department of Geography of the college conducted various village surveys. The department has carried out programme on "pomegranate farming and aware farmers about standard agronomic practices".

The department of Botany using Laboratory of Jai Hind College, Dhule for identification of angiosperms in the locality.

The NCC unit of the institution also prepared our students mentally and physically resulting students getting permanent job opportunities in police department, military services etc. the three students of the college are selected for the post of Police Sub Inspector (PSI) through examination held by MPSC.

Placement cell and department of Chemistry of college provide information about the chemical and pharmaceutical companies to the final year science students. The guidance regarding interview techniques as well as subject knowledge is given to the students to prepare them to face the interview. A number of students have been selected as medical representative, chemists and some are joined in different chemical industries in R & D department.

The institution employs optimum use of the available infrastructure. It is in the accordance with the strength of the students. By taking into consideration the growing needs of the institution, the infrastructure is enhanced. The institution has constituted Purchase committee. This committee revives the demand of equipments, books, construction and related infrastructure requirement of the college. After necessary recommendations of them, these recommendations are placed before management. In due course of time management satisfactorily completes the requirement of infrastructural facilities to strengthen teaching and learning.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for Curricular and co-curricular activities classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.

#### **Academic activities**

The institution provides well ventilated 11 classrooms; having 60 to 120 students capacity and 06 departmental laboratories are well equipped having 20-30 students capacity. The modern teaching equipments viz, OHP, Paxiscope, LCD projector and other equipments (Potentiometer, pH meter, Conductivitymeter, Colorimeter, Refractometer, Spectrophotometer, Binocular Research Microscope, Travelling Microscope, Inoculation Chamber, Wind Anemometer, CRO etc.) require for Science department are made available in laboratories. Hall no. 2 is used as a multipurpose hall with all necessary ammenities. The Botanical garden is developed and extended with various ornamentals and medicinal plant species. The vermi-culture unit and Guppy fish culture tank evolved in the premises.

#### **Co-curricular activities**

The institution has separate units for NSS, NCC, Earn and Learn scheme, Soft Skills development programme, Sports, SWO Office. Common staff room is available for the staff members. A reading hall having the capacity of 60 is optimally used, paper stands are raised for students.

**Extra co-curricular activities:** Sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, cultural activities, yoga, safe vehicle driving camp, health and hygiene, Blood donation Camp, Student Redressal Cell, Harrashment Against Women Cell, RTI, Youth Festival etc.

**Indoor Facility for sports**: We have facilities for indoor games in multipurpose hall for Carom, Chess and Table tennis. For Weightlifting the institution utilizes Jai Bhavani Sports Club, Manmad. **Outdoor Facility for sports**: The Gymkhana has an adjoining playground having the measurement 180 X 60 mtrs. approximately and the track of 200 mtrs.

Apoorva Hiray, Co-ordinator of Mahatma Gandhi Vidyamandir to implement a plethora of key assignments in tune with the current dynamic competitive environment in the education field. Mahatma Gandhi Vidyamandir has various bodies such as Executive Council, Governing Council, Board of Trustees and Local Management Committee, Purchase Committee, Building and Construction Committee. Important points are circulated from Hon. Principal and other elements of the top management. and finalized by the top management. Due importance They are discussed of aims, visions, goals, missions and objectives, stated in the constitutions of the institutions are considered.

**Principal:** Our College is fortunate to be gifted with an array of Competent Principals at its helm down the years, which could successfully steer it towards the defined goals. Dr. M. S. Patil Ex. Principal, who guided the institution for more than 2 decades. He is a famous literary person in Maharashtra. The current Principal Dr.R.K.Deore who procured his Doctor Degree in Marathi from the prestigious B.A.M.University Aurangabad. Principal Dr. R. K. Deore is successfully guiding the institution, with a research outlook and humanitarian interest. During his tenure most of UGC grants are sanctioned. In this institution, the Principal promotes quality improvement in the college's educational services in the following ways:

- Ensuring the quality of learning which forms the foundation of the kind of education the institution visualizes and imparts.
- ➤ Maintaining stakeholder relationships supportive to the above objective.
- ➤ Providing relevant, timely training for faculty and staff to enable them to provide quality education.
- Ensuring the commitment and accountability of all teaching and non-teachin staff.
- ➤ Creating a learning environment that values the academic, vocational, spiritual and developmental needs of all the students, integrating all these characteristics in a holistic way.
- ➤ Ensuring effectiveness of management through collaborative, cooperative and consultative methods.
- Acquiring adequate skill and knowledge in modern educational management systems including Campus ICT.
- ➤ Increasing access to electronic and digital information that is becoming the norm for many of our students.
- > Promoting research and maintaining a research environment in the institution
- Involving in the needs of the society and taking the initiative to set a remedy.

**Faculty:** Our institutional commitment to quality teaching has compelled us to identify benchmarks, promote good practices and think of effective support that meets teacher and student expectations. Our institutional policy is to understand better the teaching process and the experiences initiated by teams or individual teachers. Quality culture is deeply embedded from the very inception of the institution by the pioneer faculty, most of who were led by department heads trained in Universities. ### 6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring?

### The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission:

There are various committees which work according to the mission and Vision of Institution. The policy statements are channelized in the direction of concrete achievement in the field of teaching. The leadership regularly analyses and evaluates the goals and activities in the light of the mission and objective of College to the satisfaction of community and stakeholders. At the commencement of the academic year, the action plan chalk out with the institutional expectation serves well beginning of academic adventure.

After the chalk out of future plans, scrutiny, feasibility and possible risks are studied. After all this finalized programs are incorporated in the strategic plan by the top authorities. The M. G. Vidyamandir Malegaon is named after Hon'ble Father of Nation Mahatma Gandhi, so, the institution

emphasizes social service and enlightenment of the masses at villages. The realistic dialogue and interaction between the M. G. Vidyamandir and stakeholders spelt through stakeholder's meetings, discussions and feedback techniques. The leadership visits various departments, library, sports, gymnasium, canteen, water closet, reading halls, laboratories, class rooms and the campus to ensure that the adventure of teaching and learning is neatly served.

### Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional Strategic Plan:

The management encourages the participation of the staff in the process of decision-making in institutional functioning. The meetings of the management formulate the action plans with the IQAC. The IQAC incorporates these action plans into the institutional strategic plans. These are periodically reviewed by the management. Frequent visits (sudden visits) of the members of the management to the college during working hours.

#### **Interaction with stakeholders:**

The faculty proactively involve in interacting with the stakeholders. The teaching and non teaching staff, the students and the parents play an important role in functional operation of academic plan. College collects and analyzes student feedback forms that help the authorities to plan proper support for the policies. The Principal of the college ensures an academic progress of students, listening to the grievances of the students and faculty and trying to solve such problems.

The Management, the Principal and the Faculty proactively involve in interacting with the stakeholders through:

- **1. Alumni Meet:** The College conducts Alumni Meet to give an impetus to involvement of our former students in the College development.
- **2. Students:** The Management, the Principal and faculty members interact with the students at different levels. The students are accorded opportunity to participate in planning and implementation of all the academic and administrative policies.
- **3. Community:** The College has participated in all the community drives like Pulse Polio, AIDS Awareness, Literacy drive, Environment Awareness, Health survey and counseling, legal literacy drive, Tree Plantation, Water conservation, Women empowerment, Saving the girl child and Antisuperstition drive. The surrounding villages have always extended a friendly hand for implementing various schemes and drives.
- **4. NGOs and Institutions:** The Management and the Principal have played a key role in developing and nurturing linkages with NGOs and other organizations like: 1) Manmad Lions Club, 2) Jai Bhavani Sports Club 3) Arpan Blood Bank, Nashik 4) Bhartiya Agro Foundation, and Pune.etc.

### Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders:

The supports have been obtained from the stakeholders for the planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations. Prompt actions have been taken in the planning after consultation of the stakeholders. The opinions of the stakeholders are given importance in the planning of the need analysis and research inputs. The involvement of stakeholder is considered properly while making the policies and planning.

#### Reinforcing the culture of excellence:

The management appreciates the efforts of the faculty and the students by rewarding and awarding the students and the staff of the college while reinforcing the culture of excellence. The faculty is motivated and inspired to undertake quality research and innovations in the teaching and learning

# 6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the Institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the Institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

Our plans and policies lie intertwined with our commitment to expand students access to higher education without compromising quality to ensure that the economic, social and market needs are met in the areas of intellectual development and human resource provision.

For monitoring, we prepare annual work plans, including improvement targets, action plans and budgets for the college, departments and committees. Monitoring of all activities is done on a daily basis by the Vice Principal and faculty Incharge and IQAC. The evaluative report for the half yearly after monitoring will be presented in the term end faculty meetings. All the heads of departments also present their observations, suggestions for improvement and resource requirement. The annual evaluative report is presented by the Principal to the top management and stakeholders.

Feedback is collected regularly on the performance of every teacher, department and the institution as a whole from all stakeholders. In the light of the above, policies are formulated for the upcoming year. The progress of student learning achievement is systematically monitored in the existing system and this ensures the efficiency of performance of the institution. Our system of governance and management is closely linked with transparency and accountability and supported by competent Governing Body with clear job descriptions for each person in management.

The Annual Quality Assurance Report prepared by our IQAC and submitted to the NAAC also takes stock of the goals mooted and achieved every year and accounts for lapses if any. This yearly exercise gives us an opportunity to look at our functioning closely every year and to think of innovations or improvement wherever needed.

### 6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top-management?

Hon'ble, General Secretary and Management at the highest level is in constant touch with the Principal and gives enlightened leadership to him for the smooth functioning of the college. The members of the Management Committee meet frequently to discuss the problems and issues pertaining to college development, administration, appointments and infrastructural needs and student disciplines. The Principal and staff representatives in Management Committee provide information and suggestions if any. Meetings with the staff are held, if and when necessary in the interest of the institution. The members of Committee are easily accessible for any guidance required by the officers of the college.

#### 6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The studious and hard-working faculties are located properly to enshoulder responsibilities to groom their leadership qualities. HODs are the outcome of leadership qualities flashed in some hardworking faculties. Leadership among students is groomed through the class representatives, University representatives and by the representation in various important decision making committees.

Faculties are encouraged for research pursuit as research project/papers, extension activities, and books/papers publication. The financial assistance for attending conference and seminars is granted. The faculties are encouraged to improve their qualification under the Faculty Improvement Programme. One faulty enjoyed the F.I.P. scheme while the other is about to get the opportunities.

Institution monitors the compliance of faculty and other staff to the rules regarding regular attendance, discipline, social behavior and discharge of duties in coordinated way in hierarchical administrative set up. The institutional support is extended to the faculty members contesting in University Elections.

# 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments /units of the Institution and work toward decentralized governance system?

- The supportive management always encourages the involvement of the staff in the quality assurance and enhancement process of the institution. Various members are involved in developmental activities of the college such as Building Committee, Advisory Committee, Discipline Committee, Examination Committee, etc. through the head of the institution.
- All committees are constituted with a judicious mix of junior members and senior members so that the younger members of the faculty imbibe the ethos and work culture of the college and get groomed for leadership.
- ➤ Committee and the staff members those involved are felicitated for their best work. Local Management Committee (LMC) is constituted to determine and review the strategies and policies of the institution.
- ➤ The Internal Quality Assurance Cell comprising as per the norms review of the total faculty and staff need for new recruitments, performance evaluation of teaching and non teaching staff and most important research activity. The IQAC observations are reported to the Principal for further action.
- ➤ The Examination Committee (EC) consists of one/two members from each faculty aided by one member of non teaching staff. The decision regarding conducting examinations, supervision related duty, remuneration distribution etc.
- ➤ Decisions regarding the requirement of finance, infrastructural improvement and other matters of importance are communicated by the Principal to the purchase committee of Management for effective implementation.
- ➤ The Principal heads various committees and taking very fruitful decisions. He also supervises and monitors the performance of the faculties.
- ➤ Student Council: It is constituted as per Maharashtra University Act 1994 under section 40.

### 6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'YES', indicate the levels of the participative management?

Yes, the college promotes a culture of participative management. The participation is on various level of students (students council), the staff ( at the department level ) H.O.D., Management ( LMC ), IQAC, Student council etc develop academic plans for the institution.

The Governing Council is involved only at the policy making level. The draft of strategic plan for the activities of the academic year is chalked out by the Principal in consultation with the Vice Principal, brought to the meetings of the Heads of departments and later to the meeting of the faculty. After modifications, the plan is finalized and implementation entrusted to committees of faculty.

At the next level, departments and the various committees coordinated by the IQAC are asked to submit detailed annual action plans compatible with the strategic plan. These are then consolidated by IQAC according to importance, relevance and feasibility. Then with the approval of the Principal, it is put in black and white in the Year Plan. Teachers are usually offered consultative status in making decisions related to curriculum, teaching-learning and assessment processes. Teachers have representation in all executive committees operating in the college, including committees for admission. The non-teaching staff takes care of the smooth running of the administrative system, in collaboration with the teaching staff. Their head, the superintendent, is part of all decision making bodies.

#### **6.2** Strategy Development and Deployment:

### 6.2.1. Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

The institute imparts a quality learning experience for all learners in order to develop regions and national identities by improving quality of all aspects of its infrastructure and resources of teaching and learning.

#### The Curriculum:

(a) Continuous encouragement for quality of teaching and learning programme which makes learning a lifelong and enjoyable exercise. (b) To provide opportunity for progression, institute organizes different programs. (c) The quality policies begin with informal consultation with a prominent academicians, faculty members, staff and students. (d) The quality policies are being given in concrete form through various committees of college and heads of department by arranging different academic programs.

**Faculty and Staff:** (a) Different committees are appointed by the principal to monitor and review various activities and academic program. (b) There is a continuous monitoring, training and development of all faculties. (c) The management holds formal and informal dialogue with staff from time to time to monitor its formally stated quality policy.

IQAC of college sets out plan of Quality Improvement Procedures for the statement of this policy. Quality Improvement plan is prepared on the basis of outcomes of the action plan and the annual college self assessment report. The IQAC and LMC keeps regular watch on attainment of quality at all levels in all types of activities. The institutional objectives are displayed at prominent places in the college.

Through various meetings and personal communications of the Principal, Heads and Co-ordinators, the objectives are discussed and communicated. Perfect co-ordination through free dialogue among the employees and heads of department, Vice Principal or Principal is maintained. Good suggestions are accepted at all levels. The management authorities are also ready to discuss the matters freely. Hence every individual accepts the responsibility of attaining the objectives and contributes to the betterment of the institution.

### **6.2.2.** Does the Institution have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

Yes, the College has planned for its natural growth in terms of increase in number of students, making available new emerging course programs (e-Commerce, Microbiology), making available better teaching and learning facilities and improvements in sports and support services for the students. The college has long term perspective plans for development.

The academic Committee confers on the areas like:


- ➤ Teaching Learning and Evaluation with Innovative Techniques.

Considering the anticipated growth in number of enrolment, the college will need more number of class rooms, laboratories, reading rooms, additional space for library, facilities for sports and games and increase in equipments and ICT resources. The number of classrooms will be increased by the funding of University of Pune. The library building can also be extended for providing additional reading rooms and stack rooms. The College is applying for funds to UGC and other funding agencies for procuring additional equipments and computers.

### 6.2.3. Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

Yes, we have the following internal organizational structure for making decisions. Essential Guidelines and directions in the administration of college are given by Management Council. The Management council conveys discisions to Executive Council, Governing Council and LMC of which Hon'ble Principal is one of the members. Hon'ble Principal's authority is fully delegated to the strata at all the levels. The Executive Council meets whenever required and draws out plans, policies and strategies of college. The Principal is key representative of college to the entire academic community. He transfers his day-to-day decisions to the Vice-Principals and Registrar. All the Heads of Departments plan and implement educational strategies of departments. Librarian of College effectively handles important learning resources of College Library. Registrar is Head of administrative wing and he handles and supervises official work.

**6.2.4.** Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the Institution for each of the following.

#### a) Teaching & Learning:

The institution promotes value based quality education in all three faculties (Arts, Science and Commerce). These strategies are framed by the college keeping in view the quality changes required for the development. The procedure adopted for admission to various courses provided by the college as per the rules and regulations set by the University of Pune and the State Government of Maharashtra.

The strategies undertaken for quality improvement in Teaching & Learning are:

- Monitoring of academic activities by IQAC.
- Use of ICT resources for theory and practicals.
- Field visits and industrial visits.
- Periodic evaluation, Support to Slow and advanced learners.
- Peer lectures/visiting lecturers, Interactive learning through Seminar, workshops and assignments.

• Visits to other institutions, Involvement in research projects.

Apart from the lecture method of teaching, above methods are adopted for proper understanding of the subjects. The college has well experienced faculty members. The faculty members of various departments participate in academic programmes. The services and experience of library staff is used in updating library for the optimum use by the students and faculty. The evaluation methods are communicated to the students by the teachers in the class rooms and also displayed on the notice board of the college.

Faculty is inspired for achieving higher level and relevant qualifications like M.Phil. and Ph.D. The teachers are given permission to enrich their knowledge through Seminars/Workshops/Symposia, Refresher Courses and Orientation Courses etc. The college follows the self-appraisal method to evaluate the performance of faculty, which is used for correcting shortfalls. The college encourages the teachers to participate in self-enriching courses organized by different institutions. Day to Day updating of the faculty is achieved by interactions with various resources through internet.

#### b) Research & Development

The Institute encourages the teachers to undertake Minor and Major research projects sponsored by UGC and BCUD and provide necessary facilities and assistance. The strategies undertaken for quality improvement in Research and Development are:

- Constitution of a Research Cell to promote research culture among the faculty members by encouraging them to submit proposals for funding.
- Freedom is given to principal investigator to spend research grants as per their requirement.
- Sanction of study leave to staff for pursuing M.Phil. and Ph. D. qualifications.
- Sanction of duty leave to staff for participating in conferences and seminars.
- Organizing lectures of peers for promotion of research culture among the faculty members and students.
- Participation of students in research projects.
- Promoting students participation in "**Avishkar**", a research project Competition organized by the University of Pune.
- Many teachers of the college are engaged in active research work, as a result there is increase in number of teachers with M.Phil. and Ph. D. Institute inspires the faculty for active participation and organization of university, state, national and international level conferences.

#### c) Community Engagement:

In order to improve the quality the institute exercises different strategies like: NSS camps, Free Medical Checkup, Tree Plantation, Global Warming and Climate Change, AIDS awareness, Blood Donation, Anti Dowry Movement, Eradication of Superstitions, Save Girl Child Movement, Parent and Alumni Gathering etc.

#### d) Human Resource Management:

The institute has a very effective mechanism for assessing adequate human power requirements, monitoring and planning professional development programmes for faculty development and obtaining feedback on teachers. There are many staff welfare schemes.

#### e) Industry Interaction

The strategies undertaken for quality improvement in College-Industry Interface are:

- The institute interacts with various local as well as outside institutes.
- Faculty members are associated with research institutes and developed industry linkages for their research.
- Organizing industrial visits and placement camps for students.
- The college organizes field tours to various industries including Sugar Factory, Dairy Industry, Fertilizer Manufacturing Unit, Poultry and National Chemical Laboratory. The students are acquainted with real process of various productions through these visits.
- The institute has also organized campus interview of Reliance.
- We keep in touch with alumni employed in various industries.

## 6.2.5. How does the Head of the Institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the Institution?

The Head of the institution ensures that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the management in the following ways:

- a) By holding periodical meetings to review the overall progress of the institution.
- b) Through personal interactions with students at both formal and informal level.
- c) Through personal interaction of the Principal with the faculty and administrative staff.
- d) Through interaction of the Principal with the guardians.
- e) Through information available in Student feedback forms.
- f) Through reports of Parents meetings organized by College.

The management and head of the institution are always in interactive mode with each other. The head of institution gets the feedback from various stakeholders, teachers, students, parents, industry, alumnae, and the public with regards to the teaching quality, curriculum, extra-curricular activities and infrastructural requirements and communicates it to the members of the managing committee.

After thorough discussion and deliberations, the existing facilities and activities of the institution are reviewed and decisions are taken for their implementation. The available resources and modalities are also considered thoroughly.

- 6.2.8. Does the affiliating Universit make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated Institution? If yes, what are the efforts made by the Institution in obtaining autonomy?
  - ➤ University has the provision for autonomy. But College have not submitted the proposal for autonomy.
- 6.2.9. How does the Institution ensure that grievances/ complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyse the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The institute has well-defined grievance redressal mechanism to address and redress the grievances of all the members. Prompt and effective disposal of grievances of various stakeholders is being done by the Grievances Redressal Committee constituted for the overall well-being of staff and students. This committee discusses the matter with Principal to solve the problem. A Grievance Redressal Cell has been established to address the problems of the students and staff and promote a healthy atmosphere in the college. The overall objective of the cell is:

- ➤ To uphold the dignity of the college by ensuring strife free atmosphere in the college by promoting healthy student-student and student-teacher relationship.
- To encourage the students to express their grievances freely and frankly.
- ➤ To promote & maintain a conducive and unprejudiced educational environment.

To streamline the grievance redressal mechanism and ensure speedy justice, a committee has been constituted by the Principal, who is the chairperson of the committee. Suggestion/Complaint box has been installed in the college campus in which students put in writing their grievances. Prompt and effective disposal of grievances of various stakeholders is being done by the Grievances Redressal Committee under the guidance of the Principal. The cell finds solutions for problems like, harassment-physical or mental, complaints regarding classroom teaching, grievances relating to administration. The complaints are aggregated under different heads like

problems of classroom teaching etc., the complaints analyzed and resolved after consultation with the members of the committee. The suggestions/solutions are used for promoting healthy stakeholder relationship. The complaints received from any quarter are dealt at level of:

- > Department
- > Faculty
- > Student Welfare officer
- **Examination Committee**
- ➤ Anti-Ragging Cell

As far as possible, the complaints are resolved quickly.

**Redressal of Staff Grievances:** The Principal is accessible to all the members for sharing their grievances and concerns. Faculty members are free to express their complaints and problems privately. The Non-Teaching Staff bring their grievances to the officers of the college. Grievance against colleague/HoD/Officer expressed by a staff is referred to the Principal for appropriate redressal. If the whiner is not satisfied on the solution of Principal then Her/his complaint is forwarded to Institute level Grievance redressal cell and complaints are resolved satisfactorily.

**Redressal of Student Grievances:** There is a Grievance Cell to look into the grievances of the student. Grievance/suggestion box is placed at central place of college. Student grievances related to academics are dealt with at the department level by the teachers / advisors of Grievance Redressal Committee. Examination grievances are reviewed by examination department and sent to university for further solution.

**Redressal of Parents Grievances:** Parent-Teacher Meet serves as a platform for parents to share their grievances with the teachers. Parents can seek appointment with the teacher concerned and share their concern on one-to-one basis.

## 6.2.10. During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the Institution? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

No, as the institution is nurturing the faculty cordially, there is no instances of court cases filled by or against the institution. The institution always tried to cope up with the situation.

## 6.2.11. Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing Students feedback on Institutional performance? If yes, what was the outcome and response of the Institution to such an effort.

The institute has a clearly set and defined mechanism of obtaining the feedback from the students to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions. The Academic Audit Committee consisting of the teachers from all the faculties collects feedback from the graduates regarding learning process and other aspects of college functioning.

The whole process is monitored and carried out by the IQAC in association with Academic Audit Committee through a Questionnaire (based on NAAC recommendations) prepared for the purpose. The questionnaire assesses aspects related to the curriculum, infrastructural facilities and student support services. The analyzed data from the feedback is presented to the Principal and disseminated to the Heads and Coordinators for further action. In order to seek feedback from prime stake-holders i.e. students and parents, the college has formed various bodies that operate at different levels with their

formulated policies. These sagacious suggestions and much-valued opinions are highly appreciated for the direction they provide to the institution to ensure academic meritocracy.

The PG departments obtain inputs from its students who are employed in various organizations to improvise the overall competency of the students for employability. The information obtained from the feedback, be it the invaluable suggestions or agreeable or disagreeable from both stake-holders as well as non stakeholders are considered by the management, their viability discussed and measures taken to make the optimum utilization of its resources.

#### **6.3.** Faculty Empowerment Strategies:

### 6.3.1. What are the Efforts made by the Institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The college has its own rules regarding the faculty empowerment. As per these rules, all the staff members are suggested to attend conferences, seminars, exchanging the research activities, orientation courses and other training programmes. The department head takes a close review of the teachers through various input mechanisms and suggests the names of those who need further training. Based on these recommendations, improvement programmes are conducted for these faculty members in the form of seminars, conferences and workshops.

The college provides the facilities of study leave and duty leave for the above activities as per rules of the UGC/University. The members of the staff, who desire to complete their research are also allowed to purchase books of their own choice for research work from library allocation. The college appreciates the improvements of the faculty by giving those awards and strong points in self appraisal forms. The achievements of the faculty are highlighted in college magazine.

The institution recommends the names of the faculty for different schemes i.e. Faculty Improvement Programme of UGC. Certificate of appreciation to the staff those who produced or honoring the staff, who contributed towards the development of the institution, punctuality, leadership ability & responsibility, task completion on time, involvement in research and consultancy during the Teachers Day celebrations and annual function. Non teaching staff is encouraged to have computer training sessions to understand and acclimatize the process of computerization of the office, the library and various departments.

- 6.3.2. What are the strategies adopted by the Institution for faculty empowerment through training retraining and motivating the employee for the roles and responsibility they perform.
  - ➤ The institution encourages the faculties to actively participate in the National/International seminars/conferences to enrich their skills.
  - ➤ The faculties are encouraged to conduct and to attend seminars, workshops, conferences, symposia, refresher courses and orientation courses.
  - ➤ The staff academy of the Institution arranged scholarly lectures by the expert faculties.
  - ➤ The faculty is motivated for research work particularly Ph.D. research work, major/minor projects, research papers etc.
  - For deserving faculties the institution made loan, and grants facilities available.
  - > Self-appraisal forms are submitted to the management and decisions regarding career advancement are taken.
  - ➤ The benefitted faculties are about 100%.

## 6.3.3. Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

- ➤ The achievements of faculty members are monitored and updated in the college records. Performance appraisal system is implemented as per the guidelines from UGC.
- The appraisal report of faculty is made on the basis of his/her yearly Achievements, discipline, quality, etc. and is then submitted to the head of the institute.
- ➤ Besides this, the assessment of the teachers comes through the feedback forms filled in by the students which indicate the teacher's performance. Students are asked to evaluate each and every teacher who teaches them, with the help of a printed feedback form, towards the end of each academic year.
- ➤ The assessment report is analyzed and discussed confidentially by the Principal and, if needed, the concerned teacher is guided for improving the teaching techniques.
- ➤ In addition, the Annual Self Appraisal Forms are filled in by faculty in a specific format, based on which the Principal writes a report and the same are sent to higher authorities. Through the self Appraisal system we evaluate our shortcomings and improve upon them and help to improve the API of faculties.
- ➤ The participation of the teachers in various college affairs is closely monitored by the Principal. The head of institution also uses evaluation in an informal way to improve the services of the office staff.

## 6.3.4. What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal Reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The concerned committee of management minutely scrutinizes the appraisal reports and necessary action is taken which include reminding the faculty the demand of duties, stringent action such as issuing memo, reprimanding are taken for the deluding duties of some faculty.

## 6.3.5. What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such scheme in the last four years?

The institution nurtures the development of the faculty. The facilities including financial assistances are given to the faculty. The institution makes the following faculty welfare scheme available.

- A) The employees credit society: The faculties of the institution enjoy the facilities of credit society at the Institution level, viz. M.S.G. Staff Credit Society, Vyanktesh Co-Operative Bank Ltd. Malegaon Camp. The facilities provided by the Society are i) Long/Short term loan, ii) Emergency loan, iii) Corpus for next to the relative of the deceased.
- **B)** Employee welfare scheme: On the Institution level financial support is provided. Large number of the employees has been benefited by the support. Welfare schemes such as fee concession to the wards of employees, advance provisions etc.

### 6.3.6. What are the measures taken by the Institutions for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

With their gracious power the management appoints the liable and fully qualified candidates. The institution further retained these eminent faculty by providing such incentives as allowing them study leaves, F.I.P. scheme, financial assistance for organizing or participating seminars/conferences etc.

#### **6.4.** Financial Management and Resource Mobilization.

### **6.4.1** What is the Institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The institution prepared the general budget at the beginning of Academic year. It is placed before Local Management Committee. After the approval of Local Management committee the Principal forwards it to higher management Mahatma Gandhi Vidyamandir for approval and sanction.

For the effective and efficient use of available financial resources of the college is ensured by asking the demand in writing from concerned department with full details of requirement of the apparatus, equipment, maintenance, infrastructure etc. to the Principal.

The Principal scrutinizes the application and directs the department/ official concerned to invite quotation of reputed concerns as per rules of purchase of the Management. A meeting of purchase committee is held on the receipt of the quotation/ tenders. The Principal forwards the tender quotation/tenders recommended by the purchase committee to the management for final approval. Purchases are finally made on the approval and sanction of management.

#### The college maintains its account as follows:

The income sources of the institution are UGC grants, Salary grants, Non-salary grants, fees collected from students, subscription, donation and contribution for maintenance of the college, other miscellaneous receipts for maintenance of the college, equipments grants, book grants, scholarships from State Government and Central Government, deposits etc. There are different heads for the expenditure of the institute such as teaching and non-teaching

staff salaries, building repairing to depreciation, library expenses and ordinary repairs etc.

The annual budget of the institute is approved at the same level.

Every transaction is maintained on the vouchers. All the collections are deposited in the National bank and all expenditure, recurring and nonrecurring, are incurred through cheques. Every day, Daily Collection (DC Book) and cash in hand at the end of the day is endorsed by Hon'ble Principal at the closing hour of the day. The day to day financial transactions are well recorded and duly audited by concerned authorities.

There is fully computerized account department in the college using **Vridhi Software**.

- ➤ The following three types of accounts are created:
  - \* Receipts and Payment Accounts.
  - \* Income and Expenditure Accounts
  - \* Balance Sheets
- ➤ There are three types of payments/expenditures:
  - \* Recurring
  - \* Non recurring (Provident Fund and Gratuity etc.)
  - \* Capital Expenditure

## 6.4.2 What are the Institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The college has internal and external audit system. The internal audit is done by Office Superintendent, accountant and auditors appointed by authorities of M. G. Vidyamandir frequently and external audit is done as per rules laid by Government Authorities each year by Chartered Accountant. The audited report by the external auditor is placed before the Management in the meeting of Mahatma Gandhi Vidyamandir for whetting and rectification, if any. The final audit is done by Joint Director and A.G. The external audit of NSS, Earn and Learn Scheme, Examination Expenditure is done on college and University by the authorized C.A.

The qualified remarks given by the auditor are taken into consideration in the forthcoming years. Major audit objections & compliance details:

- \* There is no audit objection since last four years.
- \* Last audit done by M. G. Vidyamandirs auditor in financial year 2012-2013.
- \* The major audit points were: Nil.
- \* Salary Grants disallowed by Joint Director, Pune amounting Rs. 890/- was recovered.
- 6.4.3 What are the major sources of Institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

Major sources of the college for funding are as follows:

#### **6.5.1** Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC):

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If "yes", what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Yes, the institution is having its Internal Quality Assurance Cell. IQAC has been actively functioning in the college since 2004 with the thrust on academic and administrative excellence. Quality sustenance and enhancement are the two major objectives of the Institution and the IQAC during the post accreditation period, 2004-2012. After creating an academic environment for promotion of quality and accountability, the IQAC has been evolving novel avenues to take the college nearer to its goals and objectives, focussing on the core values identified by NAAC.

The institution has directed its activities in such a way as to contribute to national development, foster global competencies and inculcates a strong value system. Within the existing academic and administrative system, the college has evolved mechanisms of its own for the quality assurance. The academic quality of the institution is maintained by the teaching and learning processes. The administrative quality is maintained by the effective functions carried out by the various committees. The academic quality of the institution is evaluated on the basis of the curricular aspects, especially the performance of the students in their examinations. Curriculum is reviewed and redesigned and new age programme relevant to the needs of society suggested to be introduced to keep pace with the changing scenario in the global context.

The administrative system also looks after the quality education in the institution. The different committees set up by the institution are always aware of the administrative needs. The Advisory Committee, the Examination Committee, the Academic AUDIT Committee, Research Committee, the Construction Committee are all constituted and are well equipped for quality assurance of the institution's administration. The academic and administrative systems in the institution have been quite effective in enhancing the quality of education.

The students play a major role in assuring quality of education imparted by the institution. It is through their active participation in classrooms that the quality of the education is maintained. Their participation in quality assurance is assured by having student representatives on academic and administrative bodies. It is also assured by involving them in cultural and extension activities.

The main task of IQAC being quality assurance, planning and monitoring the projects undertaken, it accomplishes through the following:

- Disseminating information on the various quality parameters of higher Education.
- Reviewing the existing Programmes and introducing new age programmes relevant to the present educational scenario.

- ➤ Promoting Research and creating an atmosphere conducive to research
- Promoting the use of technology for enhanced teaching learning.
- Assisting Heads in the organization of Inter and Intra institutional workshops and seminars on Quality related themes.
- ➤ Inculcating nationalistic/patriotic sentiments and imparting value based education.
- ➤ Documenting the various quality enhancing programmes / activities of the college.
- ➤ Consolidating the Feed Back responses from students, parents and other stakeholders.
- ➤ Facilitating the academic Audit Committee in creating a learner centric environment conducive for quality education

### c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes, the IQAC has external members on its committee who have been closely associated with the field of education. Dr.Mrunal Kale is visiting in the college frequently and delivering the lectures on the anemic problems of girl students. She is keen to health of students and guiding them technically and theoretically. Advocate Shashikant Kakhandaki is contributing knowledge to our students in the field of Law.

### d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IOAC?

The allumini of College can be found in all sectors of global economy from the corridors of Maharashtra Legislative Assembly House to doctors serving in far-flung areas; from the top floors of Government administration to the ground floors as farmers credit societies. As a mark of respect and gratitude to their alma mater which has shaped and chiseled their personalities, they render valuable service to the college by instituting Prizes, delivering lectures on their areas of specialization, giving their valuable suggestions on extra-curriculum designing and other aspects of functioning of the college.

- 2) Health Mentoring and Counselling suggested by Mrs.Bhagyashree Darade
- 3) Mr.Dnyaneshwar Nagapure emphasized the need to computerize the scholarship distribution.
- 4) Mangalesh Bakliwal has suggested to Tax consultation and practices to commerce students.

### e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The composition of IQAC comprising of Heads of Languages, Sciences, Commerce, Sports, Student Welfare, Administrative Office and Student Representatives ensures that different constituents of the institution are well represented. The IQAC meetings are conducted three to four times in a year for the planning and implementation of quality enhancement measures and the decisions taken are communicated to the staff and students through inhouse meetings of various committees for effective execution.

## 6.5.2. Does the Institution have an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If yes, give details on its operationaliation.

The institution has adopted a three tier system where the Executive Council is the ultimate decision making body accountable to the stakeholders. The IQAC, the planning body, collects inferences from the learners and various Committees through participatory interactions, based on which it proposes comprehensive perspective plan to the governing council for approval and implementation. The chain of committees is in charge of implementation of developmental and academic activities assigned by the governing council. The supervision by the executive council ensures the proper implementation. The fair representation of the learners ensures the transparency in the process.

## 6.5.3. Does the Institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the quality assurance procedures? If yes, give details enumerating its impact.

The institution ensures that the decisions based on the findings of the IQAC are fully adhered to. The academic as well as the administrative working is further smoothened by the time to time training sessions being organized by the college for its teaching as well as the non teaching staff. The institution provides training to its staff for effective implementation by organizing workshops and guest lecturers of experts from different fields.

Members of the non teaching staff are encouraged to participate in the training camps organized by the university and the Joint Director from time to time. The overall impact of such training is the smooth and effective functioning of the institute. The various training programmes (Groom and Grow) and conferences, seminars, workshops are organized. Through such programmes teaching staff update their subject knowledge, skills, develops research attitude.

## 6.5.4 Does the Institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions ?If yes, how are the outcomes used to improve the Institutional activities?

Yes, IQAC plays a role to check academic audit of every department of institute. As per the academic plan provided at beginning of year the institute undertake Academic Audit. A SWOT analysis of each department is conducted by IQAC. The Parent Institution has set mechanism for uditing the academic performance through the Local Management Committee and Planning and Development Committee of Mahatma Gandhi Vidyamandir. A team of the experts visit to the college to conduct academic audit and observes the college activities in curricular and extracurricular aspects.

The academic audit is undertaken in the form of certain measures taken by the institution. These include a well defined time table for classes, continuous supervision of the actual work done by the Vice-Principal for completion of entire syllabus, internal assessment and review of university examination results etc. Outcomes of the academic audit are used to improve the institutional activities by providing essential support services and putting before a definite yardstick of our meritorious reputation. The meetings of the staff, student council and alumni with Principal provides with the feedback on the activities being run in the college. Their suggestions are taken in to consideration for improving the forthcoming decisions and activities.

The College is affiliated to the Pune University. The University has its set mechanism to audit the academic working of the college. The university sends a team of the experts like LIC, to conduct academic audit. The team visits the college and very minutely observes the working of the institution in all its aspects. The committee then comments on the performance and thereby suggest the important changes required, similarly the other form of audit comes in the form of the team visiting the institution as and when any new course is introduced. This committee, too like the previous one remarks and suggests on the changes desirable in the college. The college very honestly adheres to the recommendations made by the committees. Based on the suggestion and modifications in the academic activities recommended by LIC the college fulfills the compliance and sends the report to the university. The compliance is again crosschecked by the University Compliance Committee.

## 6.5.5. How are the Internal Quality Assurance mechanism aligned with the requirements of relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

In the institution, IQAC is framed for improving quality standards which is assembled and implements new teaching and learning methods. The IQAC takes care of the requirements of all of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities like the UGC, NAAC, and JDHE. It takes care to maintain those quality standards which are expected by these

agencies time to time. UGC and the affiliated university are the two external regulatory authorities.

The institution follows the guidelines of UGC and University as a primary policy of the institution. The institution strictly adheres to the guidelines for admission process, examination and extra-curricular activities. The requirement of quality assure agencies are fulfilled by submitting the reports of activities regularly, giving adequate explanations to the different verifications committees sent by them. Each and every suggestions and recommendation is properly compliance with proper implementation. Especially the institution is highly aware of particularly financial matters and quality education.

## 6.5.6. What Institutional mechanism are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodology of operations and outcome?

The Academic Audit Committee (AAC) is the body that continuously reviews the Teaching-Learning and evaluation process in the college. The Internal Academic Audit committee comprising Heads from Science, Arts, Commerce, nominated by the Principal.

The functions of the Academic Audit Committee (AAC) are as follows:

- Introducing progressive academic changes through discussion sessions with experts in various fields Reviewing of feasibility study report of the department before the introduction of new courses/programmes.
- ➤ Providing guidelines for Formative and Summative Evaluation.
- ➤ Integrating Extension Services with the Academic Curriculum

Methodology of Operation: Specific Measures Taken by the College to Improve Teaching, Learning and Evaluation: After the conduct of the academic audit, the internal auditors highlight the best practices and suggest areas of improvement for all Departments. Effort is made to take time-bound corrective actions to improve teaching learning. The succeeding audit ensures the satisfactory completion of corrective and preventive action.

- > This process has enabled the college to take the following specific measures:
  - \* Intensive remedial programmes for the courses where the performance is below par Added publicity for soft skill course.
  - \* NAAC based proforma for collecting feedback from stakeholders viz. parents, alumni, students whenever necessary Arrangement of Guest lectures for courses in emerging areas

#### **Outcomes:**

The institute has a clearly defined approach to the learning outcome assessment. Faculty is entrusted with the duty to determine the intended educational outcomes of their academic programs and activities. The institution has a well- defined mechanism to monitor the learning outcomes. Attendance is compulsorily taken for every lecture. Laboratory hours are fixed. The examination sheets are corrected within the stipulated time and the marks are entered in work register, which acts as a ready reckoner for the academic progress of the students. Based on the participation in the class and the marks scored in the Internal/term end examination and assignments, the student level is judged by the staff member and appropriate action is taken.

At the end of each periodical test, progress reports which consist of unit test results and attendance status are submitted to the Head of Department for further action. Counseling is given to slow learners. Parent Teacher Meet is organized and parents of such students are called to meet their respective faculty member, if required. Remedial measures are taken. improvement Period is created to give additional help and guidance to slow learners. They are also given additional lab practice. The faculty members are encouraged to conduct surprise tests, quizzes, etc. to monitor the academic progress of each student.

## 6.5.7. How does the Institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The institution has evolved a strategy to network with the stakeholders on different platforms like Parent Teacher Meet, Alumni and various committees with a fair representation of students. The IQAC in the planning process considers feedbacks collected from all the stakeholders to prepare perspectives on development. These developmental perspectives are discussed in the respective meetings of Advisory committee, Parent Teacher Meet and Alumnae Meet. The reflections of the meetings are incorporated in the plan. The college has developed an evaluative NAAC based proforma for stakeholders to record their opinions, suggestions and objections for constructive developments for future.

### Any other relevant information regarding Governance Leadership and Management which the college would like to include.

Faculty is encouraged to device various ICT based pedagogies for the enrichment of Teaching-Learning process. These are then monitored during the Academic Audit. Departments are free to invite academic experts for their National/ State level programmes, from any part of the country. Books, journals and sophisticated equipments are purchased (decision is taken by the respective departments though the college allots money for these) as per norms of the college. Evaluation is completely done by the course teacher and students are given the opportunity to review their evaluated answer scripts and enquire on discrepancies, if any. The internal academic audit done every semester is an in-built mechanism to check and ensure the proper implementation of the process of conduct of classes, course design, transaction and evaluation. Student and the faculty feedback mechanism ensure accountability. Heads of Departments along with Academic Audit Committee are entrusted with the responsibility of monitoring faculty performance and attending to communications sent from various offices of the college.

#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness

#### 7.1.1 Does Institution conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes, the institution has conducted Green Audit of campus by internal agency as well as external agency.

#### 7.1.2 What are initiatives taken by college to make campus eco-friendly?

#### 1) Energy Conservation

For energy conservation the institution insists the use of CFL. The construction of the classes is made in such a way that natural light and air is trapped. Drip system of irrigation is installed in rose and botanical garden to limit the use of water and electric consumption. In future solar energy plant is planned to be installed. Faculty aware students regularly about energy conservation.

#### 2) Plantation

Tree plantation camps are arranged in the monsoon season by the Department of Botany with the collaboration of NCC and NSS.

Plantation is made in the villages in vicinity viz. Kanadgaon, Daregaon, Vanjarwadi, Bhadane, and Waghdardi.

#### 3) Hazardous Waste Management:

In the college premises the dustbins are placed to collect solid waste materials. As college has science laboratories the chemical waste from chemistry laboratory is released in soak pit. The wastes from zoology and botany laboratory are disposed in soil as well as in soak pits.

### For biodegradable waste following measures have been taken by college: Vermicompost Unit:

In the college premises a vermicompost Unit has been set up by Department of Zoology where the biodegradable waste is converted into the vermicompost and it is used to promote growth of plants in college premises. This unit has collaboration with Manmad Municipal Council to collect biodegradable waste generated off weekly bazaar day.

#### 4)E-waste management

Computers and their accessories sold as scrap to vendors by institution after life time.

#### 5) Efforts for Carbon neutrality

College aware students to minimize the use of vehicles ultimately it reduces carbon content in air. Whatever carbon produced due to burning of solid waste is avoided by buriying it.

#### 6) Environment awareness programme

Institute has participated in the "National Environment Awareness Campaign" launched by Ministry of Environment and Forest Govt. of India for more than last 10 years. Under the campaign college has conducted

seminars, workshops, rallies and exhibition to promote the environment protection.

- Rallies and awareness drives are organized to make the campus ecofriendly. Drives like Tree-Plantation, Campus cleanliness campaign and Say No to loudspeakers for pollution free Ganesha Festival are some such initiatives.
- > State and District level Seminars and extension lectures on topics pertaining to environment have been organized here at Arts, Science and Commerce College from time to time.
- ➤ Environment education in curriculum: As per guidelines of U.G.C., the University of Pune has incorporated a course in Environmental Awareness at S.Y.B.A./B.Com/B.Sc.

#### 7.2 Innovations

### 7.2.1 Give details of innovation introduced during last five years which have created a positive impact on functioning of college.

Innovative practices introduced by the institution have created positive impact on the functioning of the college.

#### 1) Internet Facility:

The institution has 18 nodes connected with broadband through LAN. The students and faculty members use this facility to access internet during the college working hours. In future, we plan to provide free access through Wi-Fi connectivity.

#### 2) Dress Code:

The institution has implemented dress code to the faculty.

#### 3) Yoga and Physical Fitness:

The 'Yoga Exercises' are introduced by the sports department for the students.. The N.S.S., N.C.C. students are actively participating in this exercise for physical fitness. The local medical practitioners Dr. Shivaji Pawar and Dr. Bidgar are deputed by college for the medical checkup of the students.

#### 4) AIDS Awareness:

Students arrange rallies for AIDS awareness and visited the train "Red Ribbon Express" and exhibiting aids awareness among the folk. Lectures on the AIDS were delivered by the social worker Shri. Pintubhau Katyare.

#### 5) Village Adoption:

The N.S.S. unit of the institution adopted villages Ankai, Nimon, Daregaon, Vanjarwadi, Bhadane, etc. and these villages are developed by arranging programmes such as Tree plantation, Gram Swachhata Abhiyan, Health advice, Women health programmes etc.

Under these events the villages Ankai and Bhadane have got 'Saint Gadgebaba Swachhata Abhiyan Puraskaar' by the Govt. of Maharashtra.

#### 6) Staff Encouragement:

The Duty Leaves are sanctioned for faculties to complete orientations/refresher courses, to attend workshops etc.

#### I) BEST PRACTICE:

**Title:** Care of Anemia Among Young Adult Female Students.

Goals: To aware female students of Anemia.

To develop nutritional consciousness.

Context: Nutritional anemia is more of concern among rural young adult females cause of the high prevalence in rural area. Iron deficiency anemia in the Young adult females is a significant risk factor for maternal mortality, high incidence of low-birth weight babies, high prenatal mortality and fetal wastage, which ultimately esults in higher fertility rate. The age periods of young adult female occupies crucial position in the life of human beings. During this period with inadequate and improper dietary habits, one is vulnerable to all kinds of nutritional morbidities. During this age period of girls are considered most appropriate time to intervene, and behavior change messages embraced by this group can contribute to sustained health impacts. India has high prevalence of iron-deficiency anemia among women. Between 60-70% young girls are anemic, a condition that can result in adverse pregnancy outcomes or even maternal death, as well as reduced work productivity and impaired physical capabilities blood lost during menses.

So the college has planned to ascertain the prevalence of anemia among young adult female students and to provide in campus medical assistance.

**Practice:** College has deputed female medical practitioner in campus. She is visiting once in week. At the beginning of academic year a pre-designed questionnaire is circulated among first year female students. This questionnaire helps to collect information on background characteristics, anthropometric parameters and menstrual history. After studying these parameters by medical expert female students are advised to measure hemoglobin level using Sahli's method by experienced laboratory technician. Hemoglobin estimation facility is also made available for poor students in Zoology Laboratory of college. Those female students are found below average range of hemoglobin level, the Diet history of such student is obtained by RMO. She is advised for proper diet and recommended to introduce more leafy vegetables in her diet. Anemic young female students are also supplied folic acid capsules with the help of local government medical hospital.

**Evidences of success:** Prevalence of anemia among young adult female students is found among significant number of students. Students who not consume green leafy vegetables are found anemic. Almost one-third students gave history of passing worms in stool. Association of anemia with consumption of non-green leafy vegetables and passage of worms in stool was

significant. There was no significant association of anemia with height or weight.

**Problems Encountered and Resources Required**: Young female students feeling shy to go for medical advice in college on this issue. Difficulties encountered while obtaining questionnaire. College needs more female teachers to continue this practice for easily accessing young female students.

**Notes (Optional):** India has high prevalence of iron-deficiency anemia among women. Between 60-70% adolescent girls are anemic, a condition that can result in adverse pregnancy outcomes or even maternal death, as well as reduced work productivity and impaired physical capabilities. To overcome these problems of young students it is the one best practice for educational institutes.

### Post Accreditation Initiatives

Mahatma Gandhi Vidyamandir, a pioneering educational Institution has been continuously providing quality education since more than half a century! It brought out substantial transformation and progress in the lives of Indian downtrodden masses. At the time of trials and tribulations excellence and consistency helped the institution to stand firm like a lighthouse. Now-a-days Higher Education Sector is in the midst of growth and change. We are living in the era a globalization which requires higher level skills and competence. M.G.Vidyamandir recognized the need of time to emphasis on quality education. Hence, Internal Quality Assurance Cell, established in 2004, has been functioning as a post accreditation quality assurance and sustenance measure. It has continusously been trying to act upon the peer team suggestions made earlier.

### **NAAC Peer Team Suggestions Acted Upon**

While going through the performance of the college at the accreditation 2003-04 the then peer team members placed on record the precious suggestions to exploit the potential of the institution.

The institution has taken initiatives as follows:

The college could offer Vocational and job oriented courses at the graduate level. PG courses may also be considered.

At the PG level the college became successful to commence courses in Marathi and Hindi to satisfy the acute need of PG education of the rural students. The permission to introduce Microbiology subject at UG level was approved by University but the students were not approached within stipulated time. Hence, the college could succeed to continue the subject.

There is a pressing need for a well-equipped computer lab with required software. Adequate computer facility is provided to each department as well as M.com Students.

The college welcomes the suggestion wholeheartedly and established well-equipped computer laboratory with all necessary and updated softwares. Every department has supplied computer and LAN for internet facility. M.Com students can avail this facility in their respective departments.

The college could offer personality Development Courses to supplement the curricular programmes.

Soft Skill Development Programme has been introduced to sharpen the facets of the students personality. For effective function of this programme the college has deputed 03 teachers for training programme organized by Akanksha Institute in collaboration with Pune University. Besides, the faculty also got training by attending workshops such as 'Groom and Grow', 'Summer School in ICT' etc.

There is also a felt need by the students, parents and alumni to teach different courses in English medium. This could be done either by training the existing faculty or appointing a few teachers with good knowledge of teaching in English.

A few students appear for examination in English Medium particularly in Commerce faculty. Hence, it is not feasible to recruit a special teacher for teaching. Despite of this the existing teachers are satisfactorily tackled with their difficulties.

The English department has a key role to play in organizing Spoken English Workshop for most of the students who find it difficult even to converse in English.

The suggestion was acted upon by establishing English Lab. and organized Spoken English workshops. The fear of conversing in English was dispelled from the minds of the students. The local experts accompanied with the English professors of the college were pressed into service. The students were given maximum exposure in spoken English. The same practice has been resumed in each academic year. The results are praiseworthy.

The NSS and NCC students need special attention since they may have to miss regular classes to attend various camps and other programmes. They may be provided with special classes to compensate.

The students who are missing regular classes due to NSS and NCC Camps are personally consulted by their subject teachers to compensate their missed learning.

The laboratories in the college are very small in size and inadequately equipped. Hence, size of the laboratories and equipments need to be increased further.

Those laboratories which were small are extended in their size. According to curriculum and research related equipments are provided as per the demand of various departments.

It is noticed that there is only one lady teacher as against girl students. Some more lady teachers may either be appointed in further or transfers could be effected from sister institutions.

At the time of accreditation only one lady teacher was serving in the college. In the post accreditation period sufficient numbers of lady teachers along with a lady Director of Physical Eduacation are enforced into service.

It is found that there are only few teachers with research degrees. Hence, all the teachers may be encouraged to pursue Research degree. Further, the teachers may be guided and encouraged to take up UGC and other projects.

At the time of accreditation only 02 faculty members were having Ph. D. degrees and merely 03 with M.Phil degrees. In the post accreditation the constant encouragement of teachers has brought out wonderful results. The number of the Research scholars is miraculously increased. Presently, 10 faculty members are holding Ph.D.degrees and 06 with M.Phil degrees. With the constant motivation of

College Research Committee the faculty members are encouraged to undertake research projects. As a result, 04 faculty members have completed their Minor Research Projects and 05 Minor Research Projects are going on. Besides, 01 Major Research Project is also going on in the college.

Although the library is well maintained with reasonable volumes of books and journals, there is a need to increase the volumes and also provide for videotapes, CDs and audiotapes. The size of reading room to be expanded old books, journals to be preserved. Stock verification of library to be conducted once in a year.

The post accreditation condition of the library is comparatively improved. The library has increased the number of volumes and multimedia educational resources. Old books, journals and periodicals are preserved. The reading room is extended arequately. Stock verification is also conducted once in a year by the teachers of the respective departments.

Now the library is equipped with INFLIBNET having hundred and thousands plus e-journals and e-periodicals. Maximum teachers and the taughts have been taking its advantage. As per the suggestion adequate furniture is also expanded.

The Botanical garden deserves supports and encouragement so also the efforts of Zoology department in vermiculture and to get financial assistance for improvement and maintenance.

The college has well-maintained Botanical garden. It contains the variety of plant species required to conduct the practicals as per curriculum. It also contains various ornamental, medicinal and rare plant species. In addition to this the Department of Botany in collaboration with Lions Club has developed Rose Garden. It contais variegated coloured rose species. The college has well-maintained vermiculture unit backed up with the funding of Pune University.

Adequate and separate toilets for boys, girls and the staff are provided with uninterrupted water supply at desirable level of hygiene.

Comparatively the lavatories have been separately made available for the boys, gilrs, and the staff of the college. Uninterrupted water supply has also been provided. One sweeper has also been pressed in to service to maintain desirable level of hygiene in the lavatories.

Whenever the salary payments are delayed by the government for the aided staff, the college management may provide a short term loan equivalent to the amount of salary till such time the government sanctions it and such loans may be recovered from the staff as soon as the salaries are sanctioned by the government.

To overcome the problem of delayed salary payments, the department of Higher Education of Govt. of Maharashtra formed an agreement with Bank of Maharashtra to release intime payments to the staff.

In this way, the college has tried its level best to follow the suggestions of the peer team. Thanks of the college are due to the peer team, for the valuable suggestions providing an opportunity to march forward on the path of excellence.

The assets acquired wholly or substantially out of UGC's grant, shall not be disposed of or encumbered or utilized for purposes other than those for which the grant was given, without proper sanction of the UGC, and should at any time the College cease to function, such assets shall revert to the University Grants Commission.

8. A Register of the assets acquired wholly or substantially out of the grant shall be maintained by the University/ College in the prescribed proforma.

9. The grantee institution shall ensure the utilization of grants-in-aid for which it is being sanctioned/ paid. In case non-utilization / part utilization, the simple interest @ 10% per annum as amended from time to time on utilization amount from the date of drawl to the date of refund as per provision contained in General Financial Rules of Govt. of India will be charged.

10. The Univ./College shall follow strictly the Government of India/ UGC's guidelines regarding implementation of the reservation policy [both vertical (for SC, ST & OBC) and horizontal [for persons with disability etc.)] in teaching and non-teaching posts.

11. The University/ College shall fully implement to Official Language Policy of Union Govt. and comply with the Official Language Act, 1963 and Official Languages (use for official purposes of the Union) Rules, 1976 etc.

12. The sanction issues in exercise of the delegation of powers vide Commission office order No. 130/2013 [F. No. 10-11/12 (Admn. IA & B)] dated 28/5/2013. 13. The University/ Institution shall strictly follow the UGC Regulations on curbing the menace

of Ragging in Higher Education Institutions, 2009.

13. The University/ Institution shall take immediate action for its accreditation by National Assessment & Accreditation Council (NAAC).

15. The accounts of the University/ Institution will be open for audit by the Comptroller & Auditor General of India in accordance with the provisions of General Financial Rules, 2005.

16. The annual accounts i.e. balance sheet, income and expenditure statement and statement of receipts and payments are to be prepared strictly in accordance with the Uniform Format of Accounting prescribed by Government.

Section I

#### PREFACE

Mahotma Gandhi Vidyamandir's, Arts, Science and Commerce College, Manmad is one of the pioneer Educational Institutions in the State of Maharashtra, established in June 1969. The College was started as the students had to go to Nashik or Malegaon for higher education, which was not in the capacity of poor people. The College was founded by Late Karmaveer Bhausaheb Hiray, a great visionary and the then Revenue Minister of Maharashtra state. The motto of the institution is the Sanskrit idiom "Bahujana Hitaya; Bahujan Sukhaya", which clearly indicates the aims and objectives of the institution.

higher education to rural individuals and to convert their raw minds in to refine responsible citizens and to impart literacy to the downtrodden and the common people in the tribal areas of Nashik District.

Right from 1969 the college has undergone various stages of development. From the year 1990-1991, the courses offered by the college have multiplied with the introduction of the faculty of Science. With the establishment of the college, students could get an opportunity of Higher Education at local level. The management of the college has given full freedom in academic and economic matters to the Principal.

The college is affiliated to Pune University with 2(f) and 12(B) recognition of the U.G.C. The College has sufficient number of buildings spread over an area of 4.3 acres containing five Science departments, six Arts departments and a Commerce department. There are 22 UG programmes leading to B.A., B.Sc. and B.Com. degrees and one PG programme leading to M.Com. degree. The college has sufficient infrastructure with Library facility. There are 33 qualified teaching and 35 non-teaching staff. The strength of students in the academic year 2002-2003 is 1120 in the UG classes and 52 in the M.Com. Class. Admissions for the current academic year is in progress and the correct number of students can be known in due course. The Local Management Committee in consultation with the Principal plans the annual budget of the college. Additional facilities such as Playground, Workshop, Canteen and Vehicle Parking are also available. Facilities for indoor and outdoor games are also provided.

For the all round development of students the College has extra-curricular activities like the NCC, NSS, Earn While You Learn

Scheme, Remedial Coaching classes, Debating Competition and Study Center of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University. Majority of the students admitted in the college are from the rural areas.

For years together, the College has added to the development of the town and the surrounding rural areas. The Graduates and Post Graduates of the college have been successfully working in State Govt, Semi Govt, and Private Sector Services. Some of them have established their own business organizations and others have devoted themselves to social, cultural and political walks of life.

The feedback mechanism is enabled through the Alumni and the parents associations apart from the regular sources. The college has healthy practices such as providing loans and advances to the needy faculty and also scholarship and Book Bank facility for the poor students.

The faculty of the college have also published about 30 books and more than 40 research papers in National and International journals. They also have presented papers in National and International conferences.

National Assessment and Accreditation Council had deputed a Peer Team comprising of Prof. B. Hanumaiah, Vice Chancellor, Mangalore University (Chairman), Prof. Dr. S. Sevaga Pandian, Principal, Ayya Nadar Janaki Amal College, Sivakasi, Tamilnadu (Member), Dr. S. Ramesh, Prof. And Dean, Postgraduate center, Mount Carmel College, Bangalore (Member) and Dr. Geeta Iyenger

(NAAC Officer) to visit the college from 18th July to 20th July 2003 for the purpose of Institutional Assessment and Accreditation based on the Self Study Report submitted on 23rd April 2003. The team visited the college and went through all the departments; it also had discussions with Principal, Management, Faculty, Students, Librarian, Non-teaching staff, Alumni, Parents and other interest groups. The team also inspected all the documents, books and records, facilities, laboratories etc. The team is pleased to present its criterion wise, evaluation report of the college.

Section II

# **Criterion - Wise Evaluation**

# Criterion I - Carricular Aspects

The institution offers Basic Courses like B.A., B.Sc. B.Com. at the under graduate level and M. Com. at PG level. The options available give a fair amount of lateral movement to the students to shift from one option to another. The objective of the college is to provide higher education to rural students and thereby shaping the individuals in to better personalities.

The college encourages co-curricular activities like N.S.S. and N.C.C. and Earn and Learn Scheme. The students are encouraged to involve in cultural activities and thereby awareness is created

towards National Integration Patriotism, equality and humanism. The college provides various club facilities which help in the over all development of the students' personality. The college administers questionnaires to the students and parents to obtain feedback to improve the teaching programmes. The faculty has some members of Academic Council and Board of Studies at the University. In each course they offer combinations, which give some freedom of choice and mobility to the students. They have a network with Bharat Petrolium Company, Food Corporation of India and Central Railway Workshop. The students are encouraged to go on industrial visits and to take up project work. About 30 to 40 % of the courses are job oriented.

However there are areas of concern such as not obtaining feed back about the programmes from the industry, multiplicity of objectives, dependence only on university curriculam and lack of innovation.

# CRITERIOK II - Teaching Learning And Evaluation

The teachers are recruited as per the university, U.G.C and the Govt. norms that ensure fairness and selection of the right individual. The institution has given sufficient freedom to teachers to attend the refresher courses, seminars, workshops that in turn contributes to the development of skill and knowledge of the

teacher. The teachers prepare lesson plans and maintain work diaries, which are verified by the H.O.D and the Principal. The teaching is learning oriented and remedial Programmes are conducted for downtrodden under the auspices of UGC. The dropout rate of 3-15 % though an area of concern, the institution has a Success rate of 50-70 % which reflects fairly well when compared with university average of 40-50 %. The adaptation of UGC feedback form and consultation with parents and guardians provide feedback to the teacher and institution. There is a library housing textbooks, reference books, and encyclopedia. Total No. of volumes of books, encyclopedia etc is 34,739 and the No. of journals including Magazines subscribed is 61.

There are certain grey areas such as lack of the use of modern teaching aids, Computers, low student-teacher ratio, limited industrial linkages and co-curricular activities.

# CRITERION III - Research, Consultancy And Extension

The institution has 23 % of its faculty involved in the research work. Two teachers possess Ph.D Degrees, six teachers have M.Phil. Degrees, three teachers have submitted the Ph. D. thesis and one teacher is working for his Ph.D. The Extension activities of visits and talks by the teachers for local farmers has spread knowledge and helped the local villagers in better farming techniques, awareness

and usage of manures. The institution has four ongoing UGC projects with a total outlay of Rs.1,29,000/-. The institution has contributed to the knowledge fund through books and publications. In all the teachers of the college have published 30 books and 40 research papers. It is worth mentioning here that Dr. Pathak of Marathi Department has published 13 books, out of which 05 have been prescribed as textbooks by five different Universities, 25 research papers in National Journals out of which 02 papers were in International Conferences held at Berlin and Heidelberg. He is also considered to be an authority on "Old Marathi Literature And Kirtan Tradition" at the National Level. Similarly Dr. Jabde of Zoology Department has to his credit 10 books and 12 research papers, out of which one was presented at an International Conference at Rome.

There are certain limitations such as limited research publications, no benefit of consultancy to the institution and lack of resources for extension activities.

# CRITERION IV - Infrastructure And Learning Resources

The institution has 18 classrooms and a library with about 34,739 books and 61 periodicals and journals. It has sports facility for basketball, volleyball and tennis. It also provides indoor games facility. An in-house canteen also caters to the needs of the college. The performance of the students in the field of sports within the region has been good. The hostel facility not being availed by the

students is being put to good use by the Science Department. The institution conducts regular medical check ups for its entire new students.

The areas of concern include lack of inadequate journals, limited land preventing future expansion and lack of staff quarters. Though the teachers research themselves, the availability and use of modern teaching aids and computers at the institution is very minimal.

# CRITERION- V :- Student Support And Progression

The students are admitted based on merit. The institution has a drop out rate of 3 to 15%. With a 50-70% success rate, the institution is doing well to the cause of education. Further progression from Under Graduation to employment or UG to PG is at 30-60%. Financial aid to students through Govt. schemes, concessions in fees to the students and other provisions have benefited a number of students. Through the Employment Cell and Placement officer students are given guidance. Also teachers give personal and academic counseling to students. The Vocational Center rarely conducts courses for personality development, communication and market survey etc. The recreational facilities available to students in the form of Outdoor games, Nature clubs, Student magazine, Audio-Video facilities, Essay writing Competition, Debate clubs, Cultural Programmes etc, help to hone their skills and prune

their knowledge. The college also provides the guidance to the students for self-employment. The Alumni is very active and as far as the cultural activities are concerned there is a Debate club. Nature Club and an Essay Writing Club. The college also publishes the student magazine every year.

The areas of concern include high drop out rate of around 3 - 15 %, weak progression rate of around 40 %, lack of indoor sport facilities and limited remedial assistance.

# CRITERION VI - Organization And Management

The organization functioning is carried out under the supervision of the Local Managing Committee. The day-to-day functioning of the institution is run typically through the departmental structure and through various committee structures. The non-teaching staff is checked and monitored by the Principal, Registrar, and Office Superintendent for their work efficiency and workshops are also conducted for them. The institution has a number of welfare schemes to facilitate its employees through loan facilities and housing. The institution's budgets, expenditure and its accounts are audited. The college organizes professional development programmes for non-teaching staff and also has other welfare programmes such as General Insurance Scheme, Staff Credit Society that provides home loans, vehicle loans and Poor Boys Fund and also Student

Insurance Scheme. The grievances of faculty and students are redressed through the grievance cell.

The areas of concern include deficit-financing, lack of scientific performance appraisal techniques for appraising teaching and non-teaching staff, low investment in library, lack of modern equipments, lack of resource mobilization and its utilization. Use of new technology for communication and coordination, teaching and learning is also a desirable area for improvement.

### **CRITERION VII - Healthy Practices**

The institution has been providing vocational education to ensure better personal growth and employment to its students. There are internal checks to monitor faculty and students progress through various committees. The college has N.S.S. and N.C.C. units, which are doing fairly well to enhance the societal values. The college also has Earn While You Learn Scheme. The students of the college take an active part in activities like Road Construction, Tree Plantation, Water Conservation, Health and Hygiene, Blood Donation, AIDS Awareness, Oil Conservation, Environment Awareness and Anti-Superstition Activities. The college offers certificate courses in Computers by engaging a private agency.

The areas of concern include review of Vocational Courses, lack of innovation in teaching and lack of ability to learn from the best practices of other institutions. Introduction of complementary system

like Self-financing courses, Need based courses may be looked into. While linkages exist for training and industrial visits, the same may also be extended to consultancy projects, sponsorship, industry institution interface etc. Linkage for teaching and research may also be looked into. Use of modern teaching aids is a desirable addition. The institution may have to review its objectives and goals for a better focus of its activities and provision of Education as educator of the Nation.

Section- III

### OVERALL ANALYSIS

Mahatma Gandhi Vidaymandir's Arts, Science and Commerce College at Manmad is founded by the management to cater to the educational need of the poor rural people, S.C. & S.T students in Nashik Dist. The management and the Principal with his team of faculty and the non-teaching staff are taking keen efforts to develop the college. The management is providing some financial assistance where government fund is insufficient. The college is under government grant-in-aid. Facilities provided to carry on the higher education in Manmad is commendable though there are some limitations.

The governing body, principal and faculty take adequate interest in the overall development of the institution. The problems

pertaining to the learning processes are attended immediately. Their efforts are evident from the following:

- 1) Curricula prescribed by the Pune University have been followed and there is freedom for horizontal and vertical mobility.

  However, vertical mobility is possible only in the Commerce through M. Com.
- 2) Moderately good examination results reveal the effective teaching and learning in the campus.
- 3) Although all the departments are doing well in teaching learning and evaluation, it is worth considering the efforts of the departments of Zoology, Botany and Marathi in the field of research, publications and extension activities.
- 4) The department of Botany is maintaining a Botanical garden and the department of Zoology is under taking vermiculture.
- 5) The socio-economic development activities taken up by NSS and NCC deserves appreciation.
- 6) The involvement of alumni for the development of the college is also significant.
- Computerization of library and office automation is under progress.

### SUGGESTIONS

 The college could offer Vocational and Job Oriented Courses such as Biotechnology, Microbiology, Business Management, and Computer Application Courses at the graduate level. P.G.

- Courses in Marathi, English, Botany and Special Zoology disciplines may also be considered, as there is good demand potential.
- 2. There is a pressing need for a well-equipped computer lab. with required software. Further each department be provided a computer. Even more a practical Lab. with adequate computer facility may also be provided to M.Com. students.
- 3. The college could offer Personality Development Courses to supplement the curricular programmes.
- 4. Sport facilities in various games and multi-gym may be provided to give more opportunity for the budding sport persons studying in the college.
- 5. There is also a felt need by the students, parents and alumni to teach different courses in English medium. This could be done either by training the existing faculty to teach in English medium or appointing a few teachers with good knowledge of teaching in English.
- 6. The English department has a key role to play not only in the above stated respects but also in organizing Spoken English Workshop for most of the students who find it difficult even to converse in English.
- 7. The N.S.S. and N.C.C. student needs special attention since they may have to miss regular classes to attend various camps and other programmes. They may be provided with special classes to compensate for the losses.

- 8. The laboratories in the college are very small in size and inadequately equipped. Hence, size of the laboratories and equipments need to be increased further. The teachers in the Science departments need to be provided with separate staff rooms.
- 9. It is noticed that there is only one lady teacher as against girl students strength of 30 %. Some more lady teachers may either be appointed in future or transfers could be effected from sister institutions.
- 10. It is found that there are only few teachers with Research Degrees. Hence, all the teachers may be encouraged to persue Research Degrees. Further, the teachers may be guided and encouraged to take up U.G.C. and other projects.
- 11. Although the library is well maintained with reasonable volumes of books and journals, there is a need to increase the volumes and also provide for videotapes, CD's and audiotapes. The size of reading room with adequate furniture needs to be expanded to accommodate at least 300 students at a time. Old volumes of books journals and periodicals be preserved in the library itself. Stock verification of library be conducted once in a year by the teachers of the respective departments and duly certified by them.
- 12. The Botanical garden maintained by Botany department deserves support and encouragement, so also is the effort of Zoology department in vermiculture. They may be helped to get

necessary financial assistance especially from funding agencies for improvement and maintenance.

- 13. Adequate and separate toilets for boys, girls and the staff be provided with uninterrupted water supply at desirable level of hygiene.
- 14. Whenever the salary payments are delayed by the government for the aided staff, the college management may provide a short term loan equivalent to the amount of salary till such time the government sanctions it and such loans may be recovered from the staff as soon as the salaries are sanctioned by the government.

### CONCLUSION

While going through the performance of the college, it is noticed that the college has many strengths such as fair infrastructure, committed faculty, enduring Management and sincere students. However, it suffers from certain limitations such as limited interest and resources for research, lack of adequate research publications, inadequate computer facilities, lack of innovation in teaching and evaluation. On the whole, inspite of its limitations, the college has done fairly well with all its limiting factors of being located in a rural place. We are sure that it has potential to grow by bringing in the required changes stated in the suggestions.

The committee likes to place on record the warmth and hospitality extended by the college. It sincerely thanks the Management, Principal, Teaching and Non-teaching Staff, Students, Parents and Alumni for their wholehearted cooperation. The Committee specially thanks the Coordinator Dr. Pathak for his support and coordination and wishes the college the very best in its noble endeavour of providing quality education to rural masses. Further the committee thanks Dr. Geeta Iyengar, NAAC Officer for coordinating the entire process effectively during its visit.


